PUBLIC FUNDING COMMITMENT SOUGHT

Mr. Neil Young (Beaches): Mr. Speaker, today the National Action Committee on the Status of Women, representing over 3 million women in this country, asked the Government for a commitment to direct funding for a comprehensive publicly funded child care system for Canada. They asked that the Government put child care on the agenda of the upcoming First Ministers' Conference. They asked that the Government recognize that child care has been adequately studied and that it adopt the most recent recommendations put forth by the task force on child care, chaired by Katie Cooke.

They were told that the Government will not adopt the recommendations of the Katie Cooke task force because the Government is not committed to public funding.

Without public funding, child care services will continue to be in crisis. Eighty-one per cent of the children of Canada needing child care will continue to receive unlicensed, unmonitored care. The Government is making a mockery of its equality promise to women.

U.S. TARIFF ON CANADIAN CEDAR SHAKES AND SHINGLES— POSITION OF UNITED STATES PRESIDENT

Mr. Gerry St. Germain (Mission—Port Moody): Mr. Speaker, I rise today in the House on behalf of the shake and shingle workers of British Columbia. I draw special attention to the area of Mission—Port Moody. This past weekend I spoke to labour and industries on the West Coast and they clearly enunciated that they support our Government's tireless efforts to handle the cedar shake and shingle issue.

I want to say before the House that I offer my wholehearted support for President Reagan's statement to the American Manufacturers' Association last week. He told this group: "Protectionism is destructionism." It is important that the President sit back and look at the issue of the cedar shake and shingle tariff in this light.

To date, the President's statements and his actions have been highly contradictory. I only hope that President Reagan lives by his words, that "Protectionism is destructionism", as we reach a critical stage in the softwood countervail petition.
