They see around them a country which for the variety of its products, the fertility of its soil, and the beauty of its scenery, is not surpassed in the world; they are thankful for the blessings they enjoy, and they are content with their lot. They have faith in the future of the place, and they stand ready to assure that future by earnest and effective effort.
