RELIGIOUS SERVICES.

Harvard University is in the truest sense non-sectarian. Religious worship is conducted daily in Appleton Chapel, but attendance thereon is wholly voluntary. The most distinguished divines in the country conduct these services, and students have the opportunity not only of hearing but of making the personal acquaintance of the most prominent clergy, such as Rev. Phillips Brooks, Lyman Abbott, and Theodore Munger.

The University pays for sittings in the different Churches in Cambridge, for the use of Students.

LECTURES.

Afternoon and evening lectures are given throughout the Session, on a great variety of topics, not only by the Professors in the University, but by distinguished men in every walk of life and belonging to various countries.

JOURNALISM.

A clever writer can generally find remunerative employment on some of the numerous papers published in Boston.

Practice in editing is also offered by the four papers published by the Students: The Daily Crimson, Advocate, Monthly, Lampoon.

The Law Review and the Quarterly Journal of Economics are published by the University.
