On the 5th of September the duke of Bedford fet out from England for Paris, and on the 10th the duke de Nivernois arrived in London. Spain and Portugal acceded to the negociation, and Fountainbleau was honoured with being the great fcene of politics. On the 3d of November' the preliminary articles were figned, and as foon as possible were ratified by the respective fovereigns: and on the 10th of February, 1763, the definitive treaty was figned.

CHAP. X.

The DEFINITIVE TREATY of Friendship and Peace between his Britannic Majesty, the most Christian King, and the King of Spain. Concluded at Paris, the 10th Day of February, 1763. To which the King of Portugal acceded on the fame Day.
