The Englift government having determined to make war on us, the firft method cannot and ought not to be made ufe of.—It would be not only impoffible to obtain a credit to the end of our operations, but it would be attended with great expende, from the low flate of exchange occafioned by the war. The only refource then remaining, would be to furnifh orders on the national treafury: but if the flow flate of exchange occafioned by the war. The believe, that the Americans would fill prefer them for affignments of the debt of the United States. So that it is very probable, that this means of managing the matter in America, the belt the Republic is at prefent capable of devifing, is that on which the executive council may with greateft fafety rely, unlefs the United States would wifh to render themfelves hoffile towards the Kepublic, which, from every appearance is unlikely to be the cafe. But it is proper we flow of the provide for every contingency, the omiffion of which might cauce Citizen Genet embarraffment; therefore, the minifter of public contributions propofes to the providery executive council the following

## DECISION.

The national treatury will furnish Citizen Genet with a declaration in writing, authorizing him to employ agreeably to the orders of the ministers of the interior, of war, of the marine, and foreign affairs, the fums he shall receive from the government of the United States, on account of the debt due to France, or the complete balance thereof, as well principal as interest, in conformity to the instructions given to Citizen Genet, on that subject.

The national treatury will authorize the Citizen Genet to furnish or cause to be furnished upon his banker, bills of exchange drawn at two months fight, to the amount of the sum requisite for the payment of subfiftence, warlike stores; and other expenses of those ministers. The said bills of exchange should be employed to make up the said payments only in case Citizen Genet should not be able to do fo, either in whole or in part, with the sunds arising from the American debt, which he is charged to negociate.

And in fine, in order to induce the United States to make this reimburfement, in cafe they fhould not be able to effect it, either in whole or in part, with fpecie, the Citizen Genet is authorized to accept it from the American government in fuch ftate notes, bearing interest, as shall be received at par, by the perfons to whom Citizen Genet may have payments to make on account of the Republic. The orders which Citizen Genet shall furnish on the treasury of the United States, in exchange for specie or state notes, shall carry in their faces the declaration of the department for which they shall have been employed : the Treasurer of the United States, after ditcharging their amount, shall fend them to the French treafury, where they will be received as fo much ready money, in difcharge of the debt of the United States, and as expenditures in part of the fums allowed by the National Convention to the three departments defignated in the orders .---The bills of exchange on the national treasury, shall in the same manner bear the stamp of the ministerial department, for the expense of which they have been furnished, and shall be charged by the national treasury, on account of the fum allowed by the National Convention to the faid department.

The Citizen Genet shall transmit to each minister proper statements, supported with vouchers, as well of the use made of the funds agreeably to his orders, as of the manner in which he shall have procured them.

In cafe the Citizen Genet shall have received from the American government, bills or state fecurities in reimbursement of the debt of the United States, which he could not pass without some sacrifice; the loss, in that case, shall be confidered as part of the expenses of purchase, transpertation, or payments, confided to him.
