

**WILL APPEAL TO
RUSSIAN CONSUL**

Resolution Framed by Jewish
Citizens Will Be Forwarded
to Montreal.

DENY 'RITUAL MURDER'

Four Thousand Hebrews
Gathered to Protest Against
Kiev Court Case.

As a protest against what they term a cruel and unjust treatment of their people by the Russian Government four thousand Hebrews gathered in Masses Hall yesterday afternoon. At the conclusion of a very spirited meeting a resolution was framed and sent to the Russian ambassador at Montreal, denouncing the action of the Russian Government for trying a Jew in the City of Kiev for ritual murder. The resolution also requested the ambassador to convey to the home government the feeling of the Hebrews in connection with the persecution of Russian Jews.

There were many speakers, and all denounced the ritual murder ritual as a fiction. In addition to the platform there were Controller McCarthy, Alderman Meredith, Alderman Mayhew, and James Simpson. The chair was occupied by Dr. Shyne, and he was supported by Rabbi Jacob Gordon, Rabbi Mankin of Hamilton and Jacob Cohen, J.P. There were also other synagogue workers on the platform.

The case outlined. Of the mass meeting seemed to be expressed in its utterances of Rabbi Mankin of Hamilton. During his discourse the audience vigorously applauded, stamping up the situation briefly. Rabbi Mankin said that the trouble arose over the murder in the City of Kiev, Russia, some months ago, of a Jewish boy. The stepfather of the boy was arrested and accused by the police of having shed the blood of his own son. The boy's body with which to wash away his sins, according to the Jewish teachings.

Not only was there an absolute lack of evidence to support this contention, declared Rabbi Mankin, but the charge of such a religious teaching was entirely in contradiction to the Jewish faith, which even forbids the eating of meat that has fresh blood on it. The case affected the whole Jewish nation. It was not a case of the Russian persecuting one Jew; it was a case of them trampling on the Jewish people as a whole. Were this case allowed to slide, as Rabbi Mankin said, other cases would follow. It would not be long before hundreds of innocent Jews would be made to suffer.

After exhorting the people to take a firm stand and do all in their power to assist their oppressed brethren in Russia, the speaker launched forth in a criticism of a Toronto Rabbi, who, he alleged, went to Ottawa to save the life of a convicted criminal, yet would not use his voice to save the lives of millions of Jews in Russia.

While one of the first to make suggestions for a peace conference, said Rabbi Mankin, was prepared to make war on 600,000 Jews in their own land. And also an innocent Jew was held in prison while evidence was trumped up to convict him of the murder of the boy to obtain blood. In proof that the evidence was being fabricated, Rabbi Mankin told how the chief detective and his staff in Kiev had been dismissed because they had declared that there was no evidence against the prisoner. According to the opinion of learned Russian medical witnesses who attended the recent medical conference in London, England, the charge could not be substantiated. The evidence was being fabricated by a scoundrel, the alleged Russian justice, and pleaded with his hearers to do something besides talking and discussing. The time had come, said he, for action.

A Shameless Lie.—Rabbi Jacob Gordon deeply stirred the meeting with his interpretation of the "malicious, unjust, unfounded, and untrue" statements which had been made by the Toronto rabbi. He had been attacked to the Jewish nation by the "blood ritual murder fiction."

Rev. Dr. W. H. Hines moved the resolution, and in so doing spoke of the terrible conditions in Russia, and the danger which threatened the Jews there. James Simpson seconded the motion, and also spoke. Addresses were also delivered by the members of the city council who were present.

Ald. Dunn was also present and made a clear and expressive sympathetic reply to all questions regarding the new Civic Auditorium and other public works.

The matter of filling in the Bickford ravine and making a supervised playground of it for the small children of the neighborhood, in place of the present nuisance caused by the evil language of those using it for games, was left over with other matters till the next meeting on Nov. 8.

Gets in Direct Touch With
the Workers.

PROFESSOR VAN HISE

Of Madison Will Address the
Canadian Club Tomorrow
noon.

Professor Van Hise, who is to address the Canadian Club at noon on Tuesday, is president of Wisconsin University—a marvelous institution. Go to Madison today, or, rather, some day next winter, and you will find farmers from all over the state there with their families. The son will be taking the regular academic course, and so will the daughter, for of course Wisconsin is co-educational; mother will be getting the latest time-saving food-improving, housecleaning ideas from the course in home economics, and all the time the father will be learning to grow a hundred bushels of oats where fifty grew before.

For the Men Who Work.—Go into the engine factory in the suburbs of Milwaukee—one of the biggest in the country. You will find comfortable rooms set aside for the employees; rooms equipped with libraries, rooms in which, at certain times each week, during their work hours, employees assemble in classes to hear instruction in mathematics and modern languages from teachers sent down from Madison by the university.

If you walk around to the offices of the company and ask the men who keep tab on those classes why they have them and how they work, the answer will be: "We find that the men who take these courses earn product faster than their fellows, and so we have these courses because it pays."

Learn Efficiency.—Now go back to the capital again, and you will find residents at the university, supported there by fellowships, men from different state departments, railroads, insurance, and night to take charge when the cohorts of political economics as applied to their specific branch, and earning tuition for themselves, or the big commissions of the state government.

Turn the coin over and you will see a number of university professors serving as members of the same commissions—Meyer on the railroad commission, for instance, or Van Hise himself, chairman of the state board of forestry, or the state conservation commission, and of the state geological and natural history survey and member of the free library commission.

Dedication of GALT'S Y. M. C. A.—Fine Eighty-Five Thousand Dollar Structure is Formally Opened.

GALT, Oct. 19.—(Special.)—Galt's splendid new Y.M.C.A. edifice, erected at a cost of \$85,000 after a whirlwind campaign inaugurated two years ago, was formally opened and dedicated this afternoon in the presence of a throng of deeply interested citizens.

Mr. Alex. R. Goldie, president of the association, occupied the chair. Following the singing by the audience of a special dedication hymn written for a similar occasion by Mr. George A. Warburton, general secretary of the Toronto Y.M.C.A., the dedicatory address was delivered by Rev. F. M. Wooler of the Alliance street Methodist Church.

The fine new building replaces the old-time hostelry "The Queens" on the west side of the river. It is of brick with stone facings, four stories high and equipped with every thing the modern Y.M.C.A. institution prescribes, such as a gymnasium, swimming pool, billiard room, assembly hall, and various other apartments.

PREMIER'S SALARY**

EDMONTON, Alta., Oct. 18.—(Can. Press.)—The legislature was in committee of supply on the estimates yesterday. The salary of the premier has been increased \$100, and of each of the cabinet ministers \$100, as well as that of the leader of the opposition. **MONTREAL JEWS
MAKE A PROTEST**

Three Thousand Denounce At-
tempt to Revive Charge of
Ritual Murder.

MONTREAL, Oct. 18.—(Can. Press.)—A resolution protesting against the "attempts made in the City of Kiev to revive the hideous charge of ritual murder, known as the blood accusation against Judaism and the Jewish people," was unanimously adopted amidst frantic cheering by a mass meeting of three thousand Hebrews this afternoon. The resolution was intended against the blow struck at them and their religion in Russia. The speakers included Mayor Lavallee, Godfrey Langlois and several prominent Hebrews. All expressed sympathy with the Jews and the protest against the charge of ritual murder.

ONEIDA, N. Y., Oct. 18.—(Can. Press.)—Fire that was brought under control tonight after it had been burning for several hours, caused a loss

KAISER SENDS FOR MUTINIOUS PRINCE

Adjutant Despatched to Mountains Where Prince Was on Hunting Trip.

BERLIN, Oct. 18.—(Can. Press.)—The crown prince's absence from the Leipzig festivities is attracting attention, as the emperor's strained relations with the prince, the prince went to a hunting lodge in the Bavarian mountains near Garmisch. According to the Lokal Anzeiger, the emperor sent his adjutant, Gen. Von Gontard, to Munich for the prince. The adjutant proceeded to the mountains and returned with the crown prince and princess to Munich at night. All immediately took a train for Berlin.
