

HUMBER VALLEY TO BE ANNEXED

Ald. Wickett's Motion That
Speedy Action Be Taken
Was Carried.

AFTER THE RADIAL LINE

Lambton System Will Then
Be Included in Railway
Purchase.

Ald. Wickett brought up in the parks and exhibition committee yesterday the need for expediting the annexation of the Humber Valley area set forth in the Home South agreement, so that the portion of the radial line running out to Lambton, that would be in the new annex, would be included in the street railway purchase.

"Sir William Mackenzie would undoubtedly give us that bit of radial without increasing the price for all the properties," Ald. Wickett said. "But if the street railway purchase is consummated before the annexation is made, we would afterwards have to purchase that portion of the radial line that must soon be within the new limits. I move that the limits of the proposed annexation of a portion of Etobicoke Township be fixed as quickly as possible, and the annexation put thru. This motion carried unanimously.

Commissioner Chambers recommended against the proposed filling in at Winchester street hill for widening purposes, as a number of valuable trees would be destroyed. The works committee will be so notified.

NO VITAL CHANGES IN CURRENCY BILL

President Wilson is Firm, But
Followers are Still at
Odds.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—(Canadian Press).—There was lively speculation among senators generally today as to what would occur when the senate committee resumed consideration of the administration currency bill on Wednesday. The freedom with which Democratic senators discussed the possibility of a caucus to ensure harmonious and early action led to the belief that such a plan might yet be adopted by the administration supporters in order to avert radical changes in the bill by the committee.

Chairman Owen said after a conference at the White House that a report would be forthcoming in a few days.

Senators Thomas and Overman also discussed the currency situation with the president. "Wait till Wednesday," remarked Senator Overman as he left the executive offices.

The president is awaiting tomorrow's elections in New Jersey, Massachusetts and Maryland, and it is said that if they result in Democratic victories he will feel stimulated to urge with renewed vigor early action on the house bill.

The president made it plain today he would stand by the bill as it is, and the house and would not consent to any changes in fundamentals.

The faculty this morning read out a long statement to the students in the various classes, setting forth that they did not act in contravention of the rules of the Manitoba University, but that they had initiated a new rule, which they considered an initiation, for those who were forbidden personal indignity or violence.

TAXI STRIKE IN PHILADELPHIA.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 3.—(Can. Press).—With election eve and the opening of the opera season, a taxi strike came to a general strike of taxi drivers in this city. Leaders of the local union, which recently demanded that the men be paid \$2.50 a day instead of 20 per cent. of their gross receipts, ordered the men out at midnight when those demands were not granted.

The striking chauffeurs held a mass meeting tonight, and it was announced that 800 members of the union had joined the strike. Some of the strikers refused to take a taxi to the men, charged them for the gasoline used.

Toronto's Legislation

The board of control discussed yesterday the legislation to be asked for at the next session of the legislature. The following was decided upon:

To place a wheel tax on vehicles using the streets, and to regulate the width of tires.

To charge for storage of building material on streets.

To give the city council the option of appointing the mayor or an outsider to the Civic Hydro-Electric Commission.

To set aside defined districts for residence only.

To place medical inspection of schools in control of the medical officer of health.

The board also discussed an additional revenue bill with the heads of departments, and the heads are to report their opinion upon the form of unearned increment that is advisable.

PROSPERITY CAME WITH BIG HARVEST

Building Activity Thruout
Western Provinces Noted
by C.P.R. Officials.

MONEY NOT SO SCARCE HEADS RESPONSIBLE

Many Farmers Plan to Spend
Christmas in the Old
Country.

That the financial stringency meant only a temporary let up of progress in Western Canada is indicated by the renewed building activity everywhere noticeable throughout the prairie provinces. So the World was informed yesterday by A. O. Seymour, general travelling passenger agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, who returned recently after an extensive trip thru the west.

It was remarkable that during the period of tight money practically all building operations under contract were going ahead without any appreciable delay. The construction of buildings other than those already under contract for the time being had, of course, shown some let up, but with the big grain crop assured and under process of harvesting confidence had been restored.

RECIPROCITY WANTED IN MOTOR LICENSES

Motor League Will Ask Govern-
ment to Make Advances
to Americans.

The Ontario Motor League, at the directors' monthly meeting yesterday afternoon, empowered the legislation committee to wait upon the government at the first opportunity, in an effort to having a by-law passed, whereby motorists from the United States can tour Ontario without paying the fee of \$20 for an Ontario license, which is now charged. If this law is passed it will mean that the Ontario motorists will be treated likewise by the American authorities, and the only province in the Dominion which does not recognize the United States license, and the only province whose license is not recognized in the States.

The annual meeting and smoker will be held in Toronto on Jan. 19, 1914.

One hundred and twelve new members have taken out membership during the past month.

Reports presented showed that since the last meeting twelve hundred new cars had been placed along the roads thruout the entire province, and that forty towns and villages had co-operated with the league in erecting speed indicators at the town and village limits.

General Bramwell Booth spoke to the Canadian Club yesterday at a luncheon which overflowed, all the ordinary accommodation. CROP MOVEMENT A BIG STIMULUS

Southern Alberta's Business
Interests Feel the Com-
mercial Wave.

CARDSTON, Alta., Nov. 2.—The statement given out by Secretary Woodbridge of the United Farmers of Alberta, to the effect that Alberta's 1913 crop would be fully as large as that of last year, and of much superior quality, is confirmed by reports at hand from all parts of the Cardston district, as well as from other widely scattered points thruout the province. In addition to the stimulus felt in local business circles as a result of the crop movement, the extensive investments of the Mormon settlers in this vicinity will mean many thousands of dollars of new capital which will be immediately available for Cardston development projects. The new department store erected here by the Mormon leaders has meant the expenditure of \$100,000 up to the present time, while the new temple, planned on a scale second only to the edifice at Salt Lake City, will involve an outlay of at least \$500,000 more within the coming year.
