

QUEBEC, March 2.-The violent wind-storm from the east that com-menced yesterday morning at eleven o'clock and during last night develop-ed into a regular hurricane created considerable havoc in the district of Quebec. In the exposed parts of the country horses and pedestrians had the greatest difficulty to proceed on the roadway, and the telegraph wires in nany places were blown to the ground by the collapse of poles.
