by Mr. Borden in 1896, in which he advocated the freedom of a civil servant, not only to vote, but also to express his opinion politically. Settled by Statute.

Hon. R. L. Borden declared that Mr. McLean had apparently forgotten that the matter had been settled with regard to the inside service by statute, and to the outside service by resolution of the house.

"No one is more averse than I am," said the premier, "to dismiss an official, but when an official is guilty of wilful infraction of a definite rule. what alternative would a government have in a case of that kind?" No committee in Halifax or else-where had authority to dismiss offi-cials, and if anything had been done it was without the sanction of the gov-ernment.

Mr. Borden told how on Sept. 21 he himself saw three officials engaging in active partisanship. He arrived at a polling booth just after one of these had gone inside and assaulted a sup-Liberals Not Guiltless.

The action of the late government at Halfax did not come up to the ideal sketch of Mr. McLean. Mr. Borden declared he declared he personally knew of two postmasters dismissed without enquiry or justification
