

New York, April 7.—The actual cost of manufacturing illuminating gas in New York City was brought out for the first time to-day by the legislative New York City was brought out for the first time to-day by the legislative committee, which is investigating lighting conditions in this city. John A. Sanborn, bookkeeper for the New York Mutual Gaslight Company, testified that his company had sup-plied illuminating gas to the Consoli-dated Gas Company under contract, which provided that the Consolidated Company was to pay the entire cost of productio and allow the Mutual a profit of 10 per cent. above that amount. As the Mutual supplied gas to the Consolidated for 40 cents per thousand cubic feet, deducting the 10 per cent. profit would leave the ac-tual cost of production approximately 36 1-2 cents per thousand cubic feet. In the examination of George W, Doane,vice-president and geenral man-ager of the New Amsterdam Com-pany, it developed that while the com-pany is capitalized at \$42,277,423 the ac-tual value of the property held by the company is \$5,195,000. This includes

tual value of the property held by the company is \$\$,196,000. This includes plants, tunnel mains, franchises, etc. Mr. Doane explained that the re-maining \$\$3,000,000 was the estimated value of the good-will of the company.
