**SEVEN WITNESSES TO-DAY**  
**WHO HAS THE SENSATION?**

Civic Enquiry Under Its Enlarged Scope, Will Be Resumed This Morning.

Crown Attorney Drayton has summoned witnesses for the new branch of the civic committee. Subpoenas were served yesterday on the following business men, who are all the crown attorney expects to summon: The investigation goes on before Judge Winchester this morning.

JOHN W. SIDDALL, architect, 75 Yonge-street. J. W. Siddall was the original architect of St. Lawrence Market, but after trouble over some faulty work on concrete piers in 1902, Architect Beaumont Jarvis was put in charge. Mr. Siddall being associated with him.

Douglas Bros. had the contract for roofing the art gallery at the exhibition grounds.

The Metallic Roofing Co. had the original contract for the roof of St. Lawrence Market, over which there was so much trouble, and the company was dismissed by the architects, who engaged Douglas Bros. to complete the work.

A. B. Ormsby had the contract for galvanneal iron roofing on the administration building at the exhibition grounds, and also the galvanneal work in the stove building.

The authorities absolutely refuse to make known any detail of the charges or the nature of the evidence expected from the above witnesses.

It is understood the enquiry will not last many days.

Surgeon Winchester is anxious to bring it to a close, so is Crown Attorney Drayton, and so are the aldermen. If there are any goods to be delivered, they will then do so as soon as possible.

In view of these facts the damaging evidence the mayor spoke about at Monday's council meeting, which was brought out as soon as possible.

His honor will first turn his searchlight on some of those connected with the reconstruction of St. Lawrence Market.

Yesterday afternoon Judge Winchester, Mr. Drayton, Property Commissioner Harris, and Architect Siddall held a two hours' consultation, the result of which was not disclosed. The same air of secrecy still prevails around the judge's chambers, which has characterized the investigation from the start.

A proper cleaning and disinfecting, and necessary repairs were promised, which was satisfactory to the board.
