CONCEAL NOT FOR THEM.

Those who were shouting three weeks ago that Remedial legislation was a mere side issue, that the people of Toronto did not care much how their representatives voted on it when the vote took place at Ottawa, that a Conservative M.P. had only to stand by the Government and his constituents would approve of his conduct, that the Massey Hall meeting was only a "Gilt gathering," that Clarke Wallace was a crank—those who were saying all these and other things of a similar character have had to change their mind and take back all they said. The adventures of Mr. Coatsworth in East Toronto, the declaration of Mr. Clarke and Mr. Oiler in West Toronto, that they were against Remedial legislation root and branch, the still more surprising declaration of Mr. C. C. Robinson on the same question, the certainty that Mr. Coatsworth will receive the nomination in Centre Toronto this evening (for he is among other things a member of the Executive of the party) and will vote against Remedial legislation and will vote against it again, the enthusiasm with which Hugh John Macdonald's mention of "Ontario schools" was received in "Winthrop," Ontario to put themselves right on this question—all these things go to show that the people of Ontario and the Northwest are against the Conservatives as well as the people of the city, although they live without the municipality, and pay no city taxes.

POLITICAL COURAGE AND POLITICS.

The Winnipeg papers announce the dissolution of the law firm of which the Hon. Hugh John Macdonald has been the head for many years. Mr. Macdonald retires from the business altogether. In this burning the bridges behind him, the new Minister of Justice, who is to some extent interested in the question, whether it is to the advantage of the city to allow outside municipalities to enjoy the privilege of a single fare to and from the city. The issue will finally be decided by determining the relative advantages of the proposal to the three parties interested. The benefit that will result to the citizens of Toronto will probably more than counterbalance that which will accrue to the people of East Toronto village, while the railway company will no doubt be appreciably benefited by making the single fare apply to the whole district.
