## THE JEWISH NURSERY.

Institution of a Worthy Undertaking in a  
Poor District of Toronto—its Ob-  
jects Clearly Stated.

A charity which will be sure to commend  
itself to all lovers of children is the Jew-  
ish Nursery, which has been established  
at 153 Elizabeth-street, by the women of  
the Jewish Council, whose president is Mrs.  
J. S. Cohen. The idea of the nursery is  
to found a sort of daily home for the chil-  
dren of the working Jewish women, where  
they may be cared for and fed and kept  
away from harm during the hours of the  
day while the mothers are at work.

They will be kept from 7 in the morning  
till 6.30 in the evening. When their  
clothes are ragged and dirty through the  
poverty of the parents, these will be taken  
away and nice clean, whole garments will  
be substituted. Their little bodies will  
be bathed and kept clean, and they will  
play in a pleasant, warm room under the  
eye of the matron or nurse in charge.

Not only will the little ones thus learn  
cleanly habits, and experience the bodily  
comfort which means so much to the  
health of children, but wholesome moral  
influences will be at work, and many other-  
wise neglected children will be trained in  
this daily nursery in lessons which will  
be of incalculable benefit to them as they  
grow up and become workers in the world.

The Jewish Nursery is a semi-detached  
small brick building situated on the east  
side of Elizabeth-street, chosen for its  
proximity to the many wretched homes  
where the poor strive to keep their heads  
in this quarter of the city. For a merely  
nominal sum, the washroom, the  
dormitory and other workers will be able  
to have their little ones cared for during  
their absence, and on their return will be  
able to have them with them during the  
night.

The nursery will be made as self-suffi-  
cient as possible, and already the ladies,  
through their energy, have raised the sum  
of \$150 with which to provide the house,  
but they have every confidence that the  
charitably-disposed will not withhold their  
support from so excellent a cause.

## BIG BOOM FOR NOVA SCOTIA

800,000 Tons of Coal Per Annum to  
Be Sent to the City of Boston.

The Contract is for a Long Term and Will  
Double the Output of the Nova Scotia  
Miner. Thus Adding Substantially to  
the Revenue of the Province—Nothing  
of a Criminal Character Charged Against  
the Mining Real Estate Man—Montreal  
News.

Montreal, Nov. 29.—(Special)—A deal has  
just been signed which means a great boom  
to the Nova Scotia coal industry, as well  
as to the revenue of that province. The  
New England Gas & Coke Co., with a cap-  
ital of \$12,000,000, composed of W. L. El-  
kins, Philadelphia; Hollister & Babcock,  
New York; Rockefeller and Rogers, H. M.  
Whitney and others, have signed a contract  
with the Dominion Coal Co. for delivery  
of 800,000 tons of coal yearly in Boston,  
with the right to receive 1,500,000 tons at  
the same figure. The contract is for a  
long term, and is to be 20 years—and will  
double the output of the mines, as well as  
give a big boom to the revenue of Nova  
Scotia.

Mr. Lewis' Disappearance.  
Judge Dugas has authorized the state-  
ment that there is nothing of a criminal  
character charged against Albert Lewis.  
Information which the Judge received was  
not given him in his judicial capacity, and  
it was given him under pledge of secrecy.  
His informant, when he saw what an ex-  
citement Lewis' disappearance caused, and  
how prolonged and intense was the public  
interest, asked him to make it known that  
Lewis was not dead, but had gone away.  
The Judge consented to receive the infor-  
mation under pledge of secrecy, on condi-  
tion that Lewis had committed no criminal  
act in connection with the case. The infor-  
mant, who is a French Canadian, and of  
the name of Judge Dugas, is a detective  
agent, who in turn sent the story to him.  
The same evening Chief Carpenter  
left for Uxbridge to satisfy himself, the  
Judge says, with regard to the truth of  
the information. The statement now made  
is all that the Judge feels at liberty to  
disclose.

**TOLD OF JAMAICA.**  
Graduate of Wycliffe College Describes the  
Moral and Social Condition.

Rev. A. B. Kennedy of Kingston, Ja-  
maica, is in the city on a visit and im-  
mediately arousing the sympathy of the citi-  
zens of Toronto to all in improving the  
Public school system of that somewhat be-  
nighted island. He is a graduate of Wy-  
cliffe College and last night gave an illus-  
trated lecture on the country and its so-  
cial conditions.

After giving some account of the history  
of the island since its discovery by Colum-  
bus in 1494, Mr. Kennedy went on to speak  
of the people and the general state of the  
country. The blacks number about 600,  
000, but, stiff-necked souls. They are not at  
all to be trusted, and pay little or no at-  
tention to the property of their owners.  
Their homes, if any, they dig their hovel by  
cave, or in the open air. The public schools are  
only for the colored, the whites educate their  
children or send them to England. The  
churches own the schools and the minister  
is the manager of the schools connected  
with his church. He is the trustee board.  
The teachers are all like their pupils—black.
