4. It is the intention of the directors to run the company as a separate concern.

**TRANSPORTATION NEWS.**  
**New G. T. R. Baggage System Will Be Put into Operation Next Week.**  
**Movements of Railway Men.**

The new extension in the baggage system of the Grand Trunk to be introduced shortly will not apply to Canadian cities, as no change can be made with transfer companies for the handling of baggage, outside of Toronto. When the new system goes into effect the G.T.R. will be able to manage baggage from the house of a traveler to his destination from points in Canada and United States. By this system a great deal of trouble will be done away with.

Mr. A. McHattie, acting master mechanic of the Grand Trunk at Richmond, Que., was a visitor at the Union Station yesterday.

The damage done to the building of the Dominion Express by a freight car running through the wall last week is being repaired by a gang of workmen, and an entire new side will be put in.

Mr. W. M. Gordon, who for a number of years has been employed in the messenger department of the Dominion Express at Winnipeg, has received the appointment of Route Agent, and will have his headquarters at Winnipeg. He succeeds Mr. H. F. Maley, who has been assigned to other duties.

The Canadian Pacific will run two special trains in conjunction on Thanksgiving Day, to accommodate the Queen's Own Rifles and 48th Highlanders, who will take part in the sham battle. Each train will consist of 10 cars.

W. A. Ritchie, superintendent of the Pullman Car Company at Montreal, came to the city yesterday for a short visit. The Grand Trunk is offering a special rate to Buffalo to-morrow. The fare is \$2.45 and return. Tickets will be issued today and are good to return until next Monday.

The freight agents of the Grand Trunk met yesterday in Montreal. Superintending Engineer White represented the local offices. He will return this morning.

The Tariff Committee of the Canadian Freight Association will meet on Dec. 1, in the office of Chairman John Ellis, and hold their regular monthly session.

General Superintendent Leonard of the C.N.R., accompanied by Division Engineer Hertzberg and Chief Engineer P. Peterson, went to Galt yesterday morning. The officials inspected the new bridge under construction for the Grand Trunk by the Hamilton Bridge Company, and returned to the city again at night.

The house train passed last week at St. Thomas in favor of the Lake Erie & Detroit River Railway extending their road from Ridgeway to St. Thomas, will be fought in court by the Michigan Central road and an attempt made to nullify the bylaw. At a recent vote on the same question the bylaw was defeated. It is claimed that the last election was not a fair one, and the Michigan Central want it re-elected.

**SANITARIUM FOR CONSUMPTIVES.**  
**Proposal to Ask the Submission of a By-law Granting \$20,000 to Start It.**

The Board of Trustees of the Citizens Sanitarium for Consumptives—an institution that as yet has not been called into reality—held a meeting yesterday afternoon at the City Hall, at which Dr. Barwick, chairman of the Board, presided. His Worship Mayor Shaw, Dr. Adam Wright, Dr. Oldright, Ald. Davies, Dr. Playter, Dr. Gavin, Dr. Albert Nazimann, Dr. Alkins, Dr. Bryce, Secretary Provincial Board of Health, and Mr. D. W. Alexander were also present. Dr. Barwick, Dr. Temple, members of the Board, asked to be relieved of their membership, and Dr. W. H. B. Alkins and Dr. J. E. Graham were elected to their places. Dr. Bryce also moved that the name of L. M. Sweatman be added to the Board. The most important business of the meeting was the resolution to ask, upon the part of the trustees, that a by-law be submitted to the people, granting \$20,000 for the establishment of a sanitarium for consumptives, in the immediate neighborhood of the city. A requisition to this effect was signed at the institution by Dr. Oldright, petitioning him to call a public meeting at the Pavilion on the evening of Tuesday, Dec. 6, for the public discussion of the proposition. Those details as to the management of the institution were also discussed informally. It was suggested that an endeavor should be made to interest some of the prominent men of the city—the name of Mr. W. R. Brock, in particular, being mentioned—in the project, but no consideration it was determined to allow the interest to arise indirectly of itself. An Executive Committee of seven members was also appointed, consisting of Messrs. Adam Wright, Dr. Bryce, Ald. Davies, Mr. D. W. Alexander, Thomas Crawford, M.L.A., Dr. Gavin, Dr. Oldright.

**HER INITIAL RUN.**  
**The New Steel Steamer Toronto Made Her First Trip Yesterday—Closing Her Voyages to Navigation.**

The new steel steamer Toronto of the Richelieu & Ontario Navigation Company's fleet was given its first run yesterday afternoon on the route to the Grand Trunk in the Lake. The trip proved most satisfactory, and the general expression of opinion on board was that the steamer is all that the makers claimed for. The Toronto is one of the finest steamers on the Great Lakes. The boat was out three hours, and was in charge of Captain William Boyd, and everything ran smoothly both in the machinery and general management. The passengers who enjoyed the initial trip were Mr. J. Kerr Osborne of the Richelieu Company, George H. Bertram, M.P., president of the Bertram Company; Mr. John Bertram, vice-president; Mr. A. Angstrom, manager; Captain William Boyd, and Engineer W. A. Black. The engineers will take a trip next Saturday, while the directors of the Richelieu Co. will be present, and members of the firm who built her. The trip yesterday was a preliminary one for the satisfaction of the builders and owners.

The steamer Ocean left Montreal on Monday night on her way up Toronto. She is expected to arrive here to-morrow. Captain Trowell of the Ocean, who had his first voyage on the Great Lakes last Friday, while the steamer was ashore down the river, is improving steadily at his home on Melville-street. Mr. Trowell will have charge of the Ocean when she starts on her voyage. The schooner White Oak arrived yesterday with 371 tons of coal for the Toronto Electric Light Company, owned by Charles J. Munro. The schooner News Boy, a Lillian came in yesterday with gravel from the lake shore. After unloading their cargo they cleared again for the city.

Mr. George Munro, the Customs Officer at the wharf, returned from New York yesterday, and was looking after his duties again. Mr. Munro attended the Horse Show while on the trip, and thinks the affair was a grand exhibition of horse flesh.

The wharf of the Toronto Ferry Company is being repaired this week by a gang of workmen. All the breaks will be fixed up, and in some places new boards will be put in. It is the intention of the company to construct a new wharf next spring.

**STARVATION IN JAPAN.**  
**A Thousand Fishermen on the Northern Coast Living on Rats and Putrid Herrings.**

Tacoma, Wash., Nov. 22.—Late advices from Japan state that one thousand or more fishermen living on Etrup, Northern Japan, are on the verge of starvation. Some have nothing to eat, while others are existing on rats and putrid herrings. During the winter all means of transportation between Etrup and Hokkaido Province are suspended, in consequence of which the island inhabitants are subjected to innumerable hardships in the event of a bad fishing season.

A big catch being expected this year, 5000 tons of fish were expected to be landed and numbered. Contrary to expectations the year's fishing has proved worse than ever. One bank has sustained a loss of 90,000 yen and individuals have lost from 5000 to 30,000 yen each. Many dealers have failed, and famine prevails.

**Old Grammar School at Home.**  
 The annual at home of the Boys of the Old Grammar School will be held in the Institute building, on Jarvis-street, on Friday evening, Dec. 1. The pupils of the Institute are doing their utmost to make this even a greater success than the one of last year. Preparations for the decoration of the building are already being made, and an excellent program has been prepared, and special features of which will be announced at a later date. Former pupils should note the above!
