WHEAT PRICES IRREGULAR.

Chicago Futures Rose Rapidly, But Quickly Reacted.

Liverpool Cables Were Higher, But Paris Was Off Somewhat - Corn Futures Higher at Chicago - A Big Cattle Market at Toronto - Local Grain and Produce Markets - Notes and Gossip.

Friday Evening, June 2.

Liverpool wheat futures to-day advanced, closing at 3 1/2 per cental above yesterday's final figures.

Paris wheat and flour declined to-day,安平 was about unchanged.

Chicago futures advanced about half cent to-day.

Wheat receipts at Liverpool the past three days 267,000 cwt., including 150,000 cwt. of American. Corn, same time, 125,300 cwt.

Wheat receipts at Minneapolis and Duluth to-day 508 cars, against 230 cars the corresponding week of last year.

Domestic wheat shipments the past week 222,000 bushels, against 244,000 bushels the corresponding week of last year.

Argentine shipments of wheat this week were 1,050,000 bushels, against 840,000 bushels the corresponding week of last year.

Sheep-The deliveries of sheep were liberal, with prices easy at \$3.50 to \$3.75.

Yearling Lambs-Yearlings were almost unobtainable at \$4 per cwt.

Hogs-Hog receipts to-day were unchanged at \$2.50 per cwt.

Pigs-Pigs were sold at \$4.00 to \$4.50.

St. Lawrence Market.

Receipts of farm produce were fairly large, 900 bushels of grain, 25 tons of hay and 500 tons of straw.
