BOER WAR DRAWING TO A CLOSE BRITONS BREATHE MORE FREELY

Conferences With Lord Milner Expected to Produce a Progressive Policy From the Government—Peace is Gradually Overlapping War—New York Post Cable.

New York, May 25.—(Special.)—The Post's London cable says that, because of the persistence of the South African campaign, enormous national expenditures on warlike preparations, to be met by increased taxation, Stock Exchange fears and dread forebodings of coming doom of English shipping and commerce at the hands of America and Germany the past three months have proved a trying period for British nerves, but to-day the prospect is brightening. The pessimists are still heard to declare that the war is no nearer its end by domestic means until they have had an opportunity of conferences with Sir Alfred Milner, but, for all that, latest Government advice from South Africa is optimistic. The British authorities are already providing for the education of children in military drill, everything except official use of the Dutch language in the schools and elsewhere will be decided in consultation with Sir Alfred Milner.

SELF-GOVERNMENT YET

Island of Mindanao Found to Be Unfit for the Responsibility Which it Would Involve.

DISTRICTS PEOPLED BY SAVAGES.

The More Enlightened of the Population Are Prosperous and Loyal to the United States.

Davao, Island of Mindanao, April 8.—For the past week the United States Commission has been steaming around the island of Mindanao, touching at its principal ports, to interview the leading inhabitants gathered in from the adjacent districts, and to declare to them the purpose of the United States Government concerning them. Two important points were settled, namely, that Mindanao shall not be governed by local governments, and that slavery shall be abolished.

The commissioners came to Mindanao with the intention of establishing several provincial governments, but they were not long in abandoning that intention. That much of the island is inhabited by savages, and the further the commissioners penetrated into the country, and the more familiar they became with the heterogeneous character of its people, they were convinced of the wisdom of attempting to apply any considerable measure of civil government on American lines to people the great majority of whom are nothing more or less than savages, peaceful and thoroughly friendly to the Americans, perfectly willing to be ruled and ruled by laws, but having no conception of nor desire for anything approaching self-government ideals. There is, therefore, no longer any question but that Mindanao and adjacent islands are to be ruled for years to come by a Government general in character, and that representative of the central government to be established in Manila July 1.

An Influx of Moros.

While the Chinese hearing was in progress the Chinese immigration to the island of Mindanao from near and far. The principal Davao, with their advisers, were brought in for conference, a group of them, and encouraged to talk about their testimony was that the great of their province and affairs of the province were more prosperous and contented under American rule than they were under the old Spanish rule. They seemed to have no objection to continuing matters as at present, so far as Government control was concerned.

A Remote District.

The party arrived at Davao the morning of April 4. Davao is so remotely situated that the news of the surrender of Aguinaldo had not yet reached the province. The chiefs of all the tribes in the district, and the whole province, were more than ready to accept the new conditions and customs of themselves and their people. The Samaras are most distinct from the rest. They are very steady, and keep no slaves. They were unanimously of the opinion that they were very well off under American rule, and apparently had no desire for a civil government beyond that outlined to them by President Taft, namely, a general department for the southern islands.

A Land of Filipinos.

Coming out of the extreme southeast to the northeast part of Mindanao the commission once more arrived in a land inhabited almost exclusively by Filipinos. No traces of any sort were found at Surigao. Five presidents happened at the time to be in jail, having been arrested for holding too intimate relations with the insurgents. Otherwise the place is entirely peaceful, with but one company of troops in the whole province. Captain Hendricks, the local commander, joined the commission for the purpose of supervising the establishment of a provincial government. This the commissioners promise to do as soon as they can.

The First Greeting.

The first person to greet the hand of President Taft who he climbed from the ship's cutter to the wharf was Gen. Capt. Sison, who, before his surrender, less than a fortnight previous, was the chief manager of Mindanao, and whose surrender practically ended hostilities in the island. At the business sessions Captain Sison occupied a front seat, and by invitation of President Taft, spoke intelligently upon the questions discussed. He said that the people of Cagayan are now a liberal form of Government for the Province of Mindanao as the one outlined, and said his provisions were, in fact, beyond the aspirations of the people. For himself, Captain Sison said that he gladly laid down his arms and swore allegiance to the United States when he came to understand American intentions. The commission this afternoon left the shores of Mindanao and proceeded to Davao to determine as to conditions of Oriental Negroes and establish the usual uniform system of provincial government in both the great provinces of Negros.
