DO YOU WANT TWO CENTS A MILE RAILWAY TRAVEL?

If you do, support the movement now on at Ottawa to compel the Vanderbilt system to give the people of Canada the same rate (two cents a mile) over their lines in this province that they give to the people of New York and Michigan over their lines in these states. They charge three cents on their lines in Canada! Worse than this, they carry passengers from either New York or Michigan to stations on their lines in Canada for two cents and they carry thru passengers between Chicago and New York over their Canadian lines for two cents! But Canadians have to pay three cents.

The cry is raised that Canada would do an injustice to the Vanderbilt lines if they were the object of special legislation. But that is only apparent: apply the rule to the Vanderbilts and competition would force the Grand Trunk, the Wabash, and the Canadian Pacific to come to it next day. The way they have a two cent rate in the State of New York is this: a special act imposed it on the New York Central only, and all its competitors came to it of their own motion. It is now proposed at Ottawa to apply the same method to a bill for a Vanderbilt merger in Canada.
