#### LOST HER MONEY

A Michigan Woman Taken In by a Hindoo Healer.

Grand Rapids, Mich., Oct. 21 .- In the Superior Court Prof. Leon, an alleged Hindoo healer, was convicted of grand larceny and sentenced to Jackson for five years.

Leon has had a spectacular career in this city. Several months ago he appeared here, opened up headquarters in the Lincoln Club rooms and soon did an immense business of alleged healing. He claimed to come direct from India, and to have an occult power. He attracted women of all classes, and not a few society people paid him well for treatment. It was the rawest kind of a fake, but he continued in clover until arrested on complaint of Mrs. Jeannette Tandler for robbing her of \$400 in cash. She said that she had been troubled with an ailment and went to Leon for treatment. He learned that she had the money saved and went to her house He induced her to allow him to place the money in a book, which he wrap-ped up, deposited it in a box, locked it, and after making a few mysterious passes over it, told her not to open it for 90 days. In about a month she became suspicious, opened the box and found her money gone. The trial was short, and a verdict of guilty was rendered in half an hour after the jury retired. Leon was taken to Jackson at once.

#### **A CALAMITY**

Nearly Half the Manitoba Wheat Crop Damaged or Destroyed-Prices Going Up.

Winnipeg. Oct. 21.-Under the heading, "A Calamity," a city paper says: The long continuance of the awful weather this country has been experiencing for weeks is nothing short of an absolute calamity. Millions of dollars' worth of actual damage has already been done, and the destruction is still going on.

Various estimates of the percentage of crop that has either been completely ruined or badly damaged have been made, and it would seem to be safe to place it at one-half; many conserva-

tive people place it higher. The difficulty has been that before the harvest was well under way the rain set in and caused delay. threw the harvest late, and before any considerable quantity could be stacked the real rainy season began, and has continued intermittently for six weeks or more, so that many farmers have neither been able to complete their stacking nor have their threshing done.

## MARCHAND'S

Has Reached Cairo From Fashoda.

And Will Telegraph His Dispatches to France.

Warlike in Tone.

Plague Panic in Vienna-Emperor William Sight-Seeing in Turkey.

London, Oct. 21.-Capt. Baratier, the special messenger conveying dispatches from Major Marchand, the leader of the French expedition at Fashoda, has arrived at Cairo, from which place he will telegraph a summary of his dispatches to the French

Government. Capt. Baratier, on his arrival at Cairo with the report for the French Government, said the mission had not lost an officer or a soldier. He added that the health of all the members of the party was very good, and that revic-

tualing on the march was easy.

M. Delcasse, French minister of foreign affairs, has ordered that the report of Major Marchand as to the condition at Fashoda be telegraphed textually. Owing to its probable length, it is expected that at least 48 hours will be required to reduce it to the French cipher code at Cairo, and to translate it in Paris.

DRIFT OF OPINION. The drift of opinion on the Fashoda question among commercial men in Paris was shown by a resolution by the municipal council of that city, urging French Government, without sacrificing the material interests of the country, to use its utmost efforts to avert a conflict with Great Britain over this dispute.

LESS FIERY.

The London morning papers have cooled down to an exceedingly cautious and conservative tone in dealing with the Fashoda question, apparently realizing that public opinion on both sides of the channel is heated to danger point. There is a marked effort to

avoid an offensive tone. The Times says: Sir Michael Hicks-Beach has gone some way to persuade our neighbors that we really mean what we say. The time has come when it is absolutely necessary to dismel French dreams on this subject, unoperation more dexterously.

LI HUNG CHANG SHUT OUT. Li Hung Chang is desirous of resuming office, but is prevented from doing so by the opposition of the British Government. Britain is strengthening her position. Four new gun boats will shortly be sent out to Hong Kong, in pieces, on freight steamers, to be fitted up in the dock yards. The names of the gunboats are: The Woodlark, the Woodcock, the Sandpiper and the Snipe.

#### CABLE NOTES

Sir William Lockhart, commander-inchief of the British forces in India, has started for Calcutta to resume his duties there.

New fire engines, constructed on the American plan, are being experimented with in London, and horses are being attached to the ladder wagons. Great havoc has been caused by floods in the low-lying quarters of Fiume,

Hungary, which have been submerged.

The London Newspapers Less Disastrous Typhoons and Floods in the Far East.

> In Japan 250 Towns Have Been Swept Away,

And Over Two Thousand People Drowned.

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 21.-Disastrous typhoons, sand storms and floods have caused a fearful loss of life and property in the Orient. In the district watered by the River Feng, in Japan, hundreds of villages have been swept away, and 2,000 people have been

drowned. Another report says 250 towns are under water.

The Ishikari River has also overflowed, drowning over 1,000 people. Seven prefectures were destroyed. GREAT NUMBER OF WRECKS.

In a terrible typhoon off Formosa, happening the same time as the floods, general damage to shipping was done. At Temani eight junks were wrecked and 100 lives lost. Twelve junks were driven to sea and lost. Among the ships wrecked was the American bark Comet. The ship was

abandoned and the crew saved. steamer Cowrie is partly wrecked. The French steamer Hoikow is wrecked on the beach near Amoy. The German Steamer Trinidad, formerly of the Cleveland, bound here with a load of Cunard Line, was abandoned in the coal.
