The first member of the family to enlist was Alex. Munnoch, jun., a member of the original first contingent, who served in France until severely wounded, and returned to Canada for discharge. He enlisted in the 8th Battalion in France.

John Munnoch enlisted in the 7th Battalion, and upon arrival overseas was transferred to the 12th Brigade Machine Gun Company. He also fell severely wounded, and was returned home as medically unfit.

Mrs. (Capt.) C. L. Douglass proceeded overseas as a nursing sister, serving at Le Touquet in France, and also in the firing line on the Somme, and in the clearing station. Gunner Gordon Munnoch, who returned to this city Thursday, was the next member of the family to answer the call. 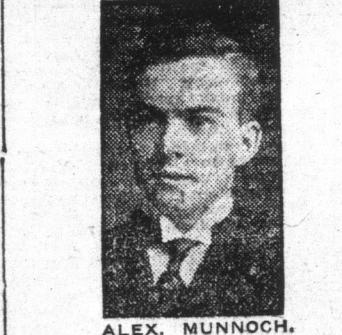
