CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY HEARS ADDRESS BY J. J. KELSO AT GUELPH

GUELPH, Nov. 28.—The annual meeting of the Humane and Children's Aid Society was held at the Children's Shelter this afternoon, when the reports for the year were presented, officers elected and other necessary business transacted. The chair was occupied by Sheriff S. S. Allan, president, and the report of the treasurer showed the financial condition of the society to be in a satisfactory condition. The debt on the shelter has been reduced to \$3,000, and it is expected that this will be wiped out in a short time. The feature of the meeting was the excellent address delivered by J. J. Kelso, provincial superintendent, who pointed out many of the needs of the work among children, and suggested a number of things which the local society might undertake during the coming year. The election of officers resulted as follows: Honorary president, Mrs. Chadwick; president, Sheriff S. S. Allan; first vice-president, Mrs. Thomas Goldie; second vice-president, Rev. G. H. Buckland; third vice-president, Rev. George Little; secretary, Miss J. G. Melvin; treasurer, T. G. McMaster; honorary solicitor, W. N. Buckingham; auditors, George Chapman, John Sutherland. An executive committee composed of representatives of the various churches and other organizations, and also a county representative was also appointed.

Cigarette Coupons Pass for Money in Siberia at Present

BRANTFORD, Nov. 28.—Capt. J. F. R. Wilkes of the Canadian expeditionary force to Siberia, in a letter to his father, Col. A. J. Wilkes, today described conditions in Vladivostok as rather chaotic, but with absolutely no hardships for the troops. That cigarette coupons, cigar wrappers and postage stamps are accepted as currency was one of the remarkable features of the situation. The city was a hive of war activity, with all the Allies represented in force.

HOLSTEIN GETS BAD SCARE BY FIRE

MOUNT FOREST, Nov. 28.—The village of Holstein, six miles north of here, had a close call from being wiped out by fire last night, when the large frame building containing the churning and feed mill of L. B. Nicholson and the handle factory of Bulter & Brebner, together with all machinery and equipment, were wiped out, with heavy loss. The fact that no wind whatever was blowing is considered the only thing that saved the village. The fire broke out in the boiler room of the building, which served both industries, and spread rapidly. The handle factory was located in the basement of the building. There was some insurance on both factories, but the loss will still be heavy.

LARGE ATTENDANCE AT NATURAL GAS MEETING

CHATHAM, Nov. 28.—E. S. Estlin, Government gas commissioner, stated today that the meetings regarding the natural gas situation, to be held in the city tomorrow, would be largely attended. Many of the representatives will arrive in the city tonight.

LIBERAL CLUB MEMBERS TO HOLD IMPORTANT SESSION

ST. THOMAS, Nov. 28.—Tomorrow (Friday) night a special meeting of the members of the St. Thomas Liberal Club will be held in the local club rooms for the purpose of discussing very important business matters. Only members will be admitted, and all those who are actual members of the club are being urged to attend, as the business is of the utmost importance. Among other matters a report from those who went to the organization meeting of the Western Ontario Liberal Association at London last week will give a report.

LIGHTING BAN TO BE LIFTED SATURDAY, STATES OFFICIAL

ST. THOMAS, Nov. 28.—Several local merchants began dressing their windows in preparation for Christmas trade today, with the understanding that the amount of display lighting would be allowed. They were naturally disappointed when Inspector Roberts notified them late this evening that it would be Saturday at least before any change could be made in the restrictions. It is stated officially tonight, however, that on and after Saturday night next the ban will be lifted to illuminate the show-cases and windows with the old pre-war amount of lighting, so that there has been on for nearly a year having been lifted for that date.

ST. THOMAS, Nov. 28.—As a means of reorganizing the local branch of the Canadian Order of the Woodmen of the World, Organizer Nicholas, a London man, has started camp, and in this city, which is meeting with success. He has held several meetings during the past few days, and a large number of new members have been initiated. Last night at the invitation of Mr. Nichol, an enjoyable euchre party was staged at the club rooms. The night was the first of a series to be held each Wednesday during the winter, was a huge success, a large crowd attended. Prizes in the progressive euchre were: Ladies' first, a whip cream bowl; Mrs. Lila Cox; men's first, a handsome bon-bon dish, Elias Yeo, and Miss Nolan, the consolation prize. A dainty repast was then enjoyed by the visitors.

ALVINSTON LIGHT PLANT WORTH \$2,800

ALVINSTON, Nov. 28.—The estimate of the value of the electric light plant here, which was made by the electric commission has been received, valuing the plant, poles, wire, etc., at \$2,800. The plant was previously run by the Alvinston Power Company, but on account of the high cost of operating the company some months ago decided to sell it to the town, if the town desired. For the last two months the plant has been run by the town, until the estimate of the value of the plant was received. The town will take place in the purchase of the plant, and the estimated value of the plant is \$2,800. The plant is a very fine one, and is well equipped for the future.
