Richard Turner, a returned soldier, whose home is on the Hamilton road near the Gore road, pleaded guilty in police court today to stealing the wallets of two other returned soldiers, one containing \$5 and the other \$36, on Thursday and Wednesday nights. Turner was remanded for sentence until next Thursday.
