VOLUNTEER POLICEMEN

Are Attacked by the Striking "Cops" and Relieved of Weapons.

Boston, Sept. 11.—Another death oc-curred when Raymond Bayers of Cam-bridge tried to escape from state guards, who had rounded up a group of ards, who had rounded up a group of participants in dice games on Boston pummon. Bayer was shot through the eck, Richard D. Reemts, a striking police-pan, was shot and dangerously wound-Richard D. Reemts, a striking policeman, was shot and dangerously wounded this morning.

The authorities claim that Reemts was one of two former officers who held up two volunteer policemen. Juring the night, and stripped them of their guns, clubs and badges. Arthur D. Shea, a striking policeman, and the alleged companion of Reemts, was arrested. charged with robbery.

Brig.-Gen. Parker, who is acting as administrative head of the military and police forces in the city, said that and police forces in the city, said that his force was completed for present purposes. Guardsmen, whose bayonets bristled in the streets today, operated out of the police station houses with the volunteers. The latter were ununiformed, but wore badges and carried clubs. Gen. Harker set under way an investigation of the shooting in the South Boston district, in which two persons were killed and many injured. South Boston Troublesome.

State guardsmen arriving first were sent to that district and were immediately greeted with showers of stones. The first force of 350 soldiers was quickly supplemented by others with riot guns. During one of the outbreaks the troops, untable to clear the streets by firing into the air, turned their guns on the mob. A dozen men dropped to the pavement. One man was killed almost instantly, while a second died of his wounds within a short time. Many others were seriously injured. Scollay Square, one of the amusement centres of the city, was the starting-place of several big crowds. Thousands would gather, only to be sent scurrying down side streets by troopers, who used the broad side of their sabres freely, but it was not until the troopers had fired their pistols into the crowd, mortally wounding an unidentified man, that order was fully restored.
