A. is now supporting six secretaries in the East, one in Japan, two in China, and three in India. The new budget for the foreign secretary work for Canada amounts to \$10,000, and will include the support of two new secretaries, one for Japan and one for India. Miss Beattle hopes to so thoroughly interest the people of London in this work that they will want to share in helping make up the budget amount.

Miss Beattle also wants the young women of the country to become interested in the foreign work of the Y. W. C. A. with a view to becoming a secretary.
