Carmen Beats Heck For 21st Win When Both Relieve Even

Score 5-5 As Desired Duel Is Put On—London ex-Major League Touched For Five Runs in Third.

The fans had the situation they wished to see wished on them yesterday, when Carmen and old Bobby Heck stacked up against one another, and the former won the verdict from a 5-5 start by a score of 8 to 5.

Deviney, the new Boston Red Sox hurler, departed the hill for the Tecs to start off with, and while the Tribe gathered three runs off Pettie Behan's delivery in the first, the Hams came right back strong with five runs in the third, Carmen relieving the major league when two were on the bases, and they both scored on a sacrifice fly and a wild throw by Carmen himself. The Tribe-men got right on Behan's trail for two more runs in their third and that gave Behan the hook and the losing title.

After that brilliant fielding the local crew have performed during the season, allowed but two hits while Heck was being found for one more. One of them, Dowling's double, going for nothing but applause. Heck only allowed one hit during the first three, which ended the scoring of the game, but it was good for three runs, the first being a sacrifice fly from the old London favorite and the new one, Bobby probably had a shade in that he had the thinking to do and he thought them off around second and third bases, while Carmen depended upon the family plate to pull him through.

Mister Morrisette, who hurried yesterday, between bursts of temperament was shoved off the coaching lines by Umpire O'Hearne for sarcasm which was too biting at times, and this, Kennedy's great dive after Mainwether's short line into the right garden in the second about furnished the features of the game.

It was as light after the fourth when Bobby was jumped on that there wasn't room for a squeak.

Kuhn took a walk and was tallied by Witry's double, which had all the earmarks of a homer, and then with two gone Pittsinger slipped under a single to centre, scoring Witry, making the going out himself a moment later while going to the showers.

Heck started in the fourth and Dowling waited out a free pass to first, then singled and Shay walked, with the bases populated Neitzke shot one at Carlin, he held long and the erstwhile London favorite made an error, which gave the Tribe a run and then when Kuhn's well-aid choice, Witry's choice out of Neitzke at second and Carlin's choice out of Witry. That ended the scoring of the game.
