

The gross earnings were \$26,-004.29, and the profit was \$19,-183.18, \$6107.55 having been expended on capital account.
There are 2142 consumers and 334,227,000 gallons of water was pumped, as compared with 267,647,000 in 1906. To each pound of coal 191 gallons of water was pumped.

At the last election the ratepayers gave their consent to the expenditure of \$125,000 on remodeling the system so as to provide a pure water supply and increased fire protection. The commissioners have engaged Engineer Davis of Berlin to superintend reconstruction. Pure springs of ample power will be tapped some few miles up the river and brought to the pumping station, and a stand pipe erected for fire pres-

## PARKS EXPERT **GIVES THE CITY**

And Controller Hocken Will Attempt to Secure a Real Commission Without Delay.

The proposal that the city apply to the legislature during the present session for power to establish a parks commission, will be submitted by Controller Hocken, at a meeting of the special committee on reorganization of the parks system, to be held to-morrow

afternoon.

The address given by Sylvester Baxter, chairinan of the Boston parks commission, before the city council yesterday afternoon, together with other information gathered, has convinced the controller that the time is ripe for action. While the time limit for median of applications to the legisfor making of applications to the legis-lature has expired, he is confident that an extension can be obtained. His idea is that the commissioners, whose num-ber has yet to be decided upon, should be unsalaried, with provision, however, that any expenses, such as those incurred by necessary travel, should be defrayed by the city council, which body would regulate the amount of the

body would regulate the amount of the yearly appropriations, leaving entirely in the hands of the commissioners the manner of disposal of the funds.

This is the system practised in Boston, as explained by Mr. Baxter, who, in addition to holding the chairmanship of the parks commission there, is secretary of the Metropolitan Improvements commission, a body which controls the parks systems of 40 municipalities in the neighborhood of Boston.

Among the interested listeners were: Acting Parks Commissioner Harris, Charles E. Chambers, secretary of the parks department, and E. W. Carter,

Mr. Baxter enunciated as one of vital rinciples of parks improvement, that he people should not be given what hey want, but what they should want. The first thing to consider in the reorganization of a parks system was the especial fitness of the authorities to be entrusted with the work. It was a fallacy to suppose that a good man could do good work under any conditions. There must be continuity of administration and adherence to a definite policy. If any improvement were

the next, thru a snap judgment, so much time and energy was wasted.

"Give the authorities absolute and undivided responsibility. That has been the secret of the best work," he said. Mr. Baxter spoke of the special Park Act in Boston as having been followed by a general Park Act and the development of the Metropolitan park system, embracing sewerage, park and water commissions, which, while sepa-rate bodies, acted in co-ordination.
