Crop Rotation. Crop rotation is of utmost importance in dealing with the perennial sow thistle and other weeds of like nature Some sharp, short rotation of crops should be adopted, which will allow of the frequent use of the cultivator, the cutting of the flowers before seeding, and the introduction of a smother crop or hoed crop. One cannot recommen

a system of cropping which will be suitable in all kinds of farming. Each farmer must select the rotation which

which the thistle in its weakened state cannot continue to grow. The same result is obtained by covering the plants with straw, dirt, leaves, etc., to a sufficient depth to prevent them from reaching the light and keeping them covered long enough to exhaust the "roots." This will require a year at least. Such treatment is of course only practicable in dealing with small patches.

The growing of such crops as potatoes, corn and roots, which allow of thoro cultivation and hand-hoeing, pro-vides a means by which many weeds may be effectively fought. 
