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U. S. NATIONAL REGATTA

Canadian Oarsmen and Scullers Who Will Compete at Washington.

NEW YORK, July 18—Rowing champions of America, as well as canada, will compete in the 57th annual regatta of the National Association of Amateur Oarsmen, over a 11-4-mile straightaway course on the Potomac River, opposite Potomac Park, Washington, D.C., on Friday and Saturday, Aug. 12 and 18. The government wharf, near Easby's Point, starting well over on the Analostan Island side of the river and will strike across the channel in a direct line, paralleled with the seawall of Potomac Point, to a point 100 yards west of the Association single race to mac Point, to a point 100 yards west of the highway bridge. It will be 500 feet wide and was selected in order than on the upper river course where than on the upper river course where the regattas were rowed in the past.

The national championships are the aim of all the first-class scullers and crewmen of this country. The national championships are the aim of all the first-class scullers and crewmen of this country. They follow the months of training necessary for development in the local regattas, which usually act as a tryout for the big championships.

The races this year will include a special junior eight-oared shell contest and also the twelve regular events extanding over the two days; single sculls, one fourthmile dash, intermediate, senior, association and championship doubles; intermediate and senior four-oared shell; intermediate, senior and international quadruple scull or centipede; intermediate and senior eight-oared

national quadruple scull or centipede; intermediate and senior eight-oared shell. Entries will close on July 20, with Secretary Fred Fortmeyer, box 740; New York City.

Among the Canadian crews expected to row will be the Winnipeg senior four (F. F. Carruthers, bow: E. E. Allen, C. B. Addous, C. S. Riley, stroke), which so shocked the English critics by winning the Stewards' Cup, a trophy never before won by any but English crews. The Pegs will give the international fours a real meaning this year.

The Vespers of Philadelphia will try to regain the championship in the serror eights. The last won at the world's fair in St.Louis in 1904, when they beat five crack crews at Philadelphia on July 4, including Nassau, which has since disbanded; New York A.C., present champions; Detroit B.C., Wahnetah of Flushing, L.I., who won the American Henley on May 21 at Philadelphia, and also at Harlem on May 30; and the Ariels of Baltimore.

Opposed to him were Fred Demoruello, Robert Young and Beverley Hoffman, all powerful scullers of the Young Men's Gymnastic Club of that city. Shears, who is a member of the St. John Rowing Club, may also raw senjor double with E.H. Keep. They won in the regattarta the same day They might give Guessel and Shepherd of the Harlem Club a hard rub. The New York pair will row at the Canadian regatta.
