

## APPEAL AWARD OF ARBITRATOR

City Objects to Compensation  
Allowed Property  
Owners.

### HEARD AT OSGOODE

Judgment Was Reserved by  
the Appellate Division  
Yesterday.

An appeal from the award of the official arbitrator in the claim of Mrs. Gibson and James J. O'Neill against the city for the rounding of the northeast corner of Gerard and Parliament streets was before the appellate division at Osgoode Hall yesterday. Damages to the amount of \$1700 were allowed by the arbitrator, as the land was damaged by the rounding. Mrs. Gibson, the owner of the land, received \$665.18 and O'Neill, the lessee, received \$1034.44. The property has been sublet by O'Neill to Hallett and Wagner at a monthly rental of \$400. The former was to erect a building which was to be used as a moving picture house and the latter as a billiard room. The sum of \$2000 was ordered to be paid by the arbitrator for the delay caused by the city's action and \$1900 for architect's fees and the extra cost of a building with rounded corner. Hallett and Wagner were also allowed \$2000 for the loss of seats in the theatre and of space for a billiard table upstairs. This was the subject of the city's main appeal as stated by I. S. Parry for the city. He stated that this was a duplication of the damage caused to O'Neill and no number of sub-leases could affect the amount of damage to be paid. He further stated that the sub-lessees paid no less rent by reason of the change, but O'Neill assigned to them the compensation to be received by him from the city, which was the only compensation to which they were entitled. Strachan Johnston, K.C., was satisfied with the allowance to his client, Mrs. Gibson. A. C. McMaster, in behalf of O'Neill, Hallett and Wagner, claimed that the city's action was made in the award to the sub-lessees unless it were increased. He also claimed that the city's action was responsible in expropriating part of the property for the building not now being erected. Judgment was reserved.

## SIXTY-NINTH BATTERY NOW HALF RECRUITED

## MORE VETERANS ARRIVE IN CITY

Thirty Soldiers Return From  
Service—Thirteen Are  
Toronto Men.

### THRILLING TALES

Peculiar Accidents and Nar-  
row Escapes Recorded by  
the Heroes.

Thirty more war veterans arrived in this city yesterday after being on active service overseas. Thirteen of them are Toronto men. The contingent of returned soldiers was met at the Union Station by relatives and the band of the 16th Q. O. R. Battalion. Motor-cars, provided by the Citizens' Voluntary Aid Association, were used to convey the soldiers to the Military Convalescent Home on College street, where more friends and relatives were waiting to greet them.

The Reception Ceremony. At the Convalescent Home Sergeant Major Geo. O'Brien, representing the mayor, W. D. McPherson, M.L.A., Controller R. H. Cameron, Ald. Ryding and J. E. Coleman of the Citizens' Voluntary Aid Association, took part in the reception ceremonies. W. D. McPherson, representing the Ontario Government in welcoming the returned soldiers said it was appropriate that they should arrive on Empire Day, because "Empire Day meant more to Canada this year than ever before." He stated it was the aim of the government to provide fitting positions for the men who had returned incapacitated from the front.

Pte. W. B. Parker, 2nd Pioneer Battalion, left Paris only a comparatively short time ago to serve in France. Only eleven weeks ago he was wounded in the left arm while carrying a wounded comrade to a place of safety, and later it was found necessary to amputate the member. Immediately after he was struck in the arm he received a shell from a shell in his right side, one piece striking just over the heart. The fragments are still in his body. A wife and child live in Brantford.

A wife and two small sons were at the hospital to meet Corporal J. M. Hill, 3rd Battery, C.F.A., a resident of Weston, and a former member of the Toronto police force. On December 2, a shell burst beneath his horse and he sustained a broken hip in a bad fall.

A Peculiar Injury. Pte. J. E. Adams, Royal Canadian Dragoons whose home is at 180 Ligar street, suffered a most peculiar injury. At Messines on August 11 a big shell exploded near him and the concussion fractured his skull. He did not sustain a wound of any kind. He is now discharged.

A peculiar accident also befell Pte. R. J. Roberts, No. 1 Tunnelling Company, whose home is at 48 Wyndham avenue. While rising in a mechanical transport at Wolverton, near Armentieres, the automobile took fire and his comrades fell upon him in their haste to escape the sudden flame. His skull was fractured.

## COMMISSIONERS UNABLE TO REACH A DECISION

Suggestion That Holidays of the  
Police Force Be Reduced  
Left for Consideration.

No definite conclusion was reached by the police commissioners yesterday afternoon at the city hall, when the reduced strength of the police force came up for debate, and the suggestion that the holidays of members of the force be reduced from one day a week to one day every two weeks, so as to remedy the shortage. The matter will be called up at the next meeting of the board.

Policeman Connolly (352) was awarded a merit mark for recovering a stolen car and arresting the thieves recently. Sergeant Irvine of Ossington avenue police station, was granted leave to retire from the force on July 1, because of ill-health. Policeman McNamara (372) will also shortly retire, for the same reason.

A prisoner in the police court dock, having been found in possession of a small quantity of cocaine, believed to have been passed to him by a friend in the court, the commissioners decided that the dock should be provided with a closer screen, to prevent a recurrence of the act.

The resignations of Policemen Barber (492), Gough (543), and Beatty (471), who are leaving the force for various reasons, were accepted.

**CLAIMED TUBERCULOSIS  
IN COMPANY'S FACTORY**

Geo. Reid Charges Illness Originated Thru Unsatisfactory Conditions.

That he contracted tuberculosis thru unsatisfactory conditions in the F. W. Ellis Company's factory, is the allegation upon which George R. Reid is basing a claim for \$6,000 from the company.

In testifying before a jury in the assize court yesterday, the plaintiff contended that the company failed to install exhaust fans. Under cross-examination he admitted having left the

employment of the company following a dispute over "the punching of the time-clock." The hearing will be continued today.

**SAYS LOT WAS MISREPRESENTED.**

Alleging that the desirability of certain property and its location were misrepresented to him, Dr. Carlisle A. Mills, dentist, opened his case against Jacob S. Farrow and F. W. Lzler in the non-jury assize court before Justice Sutherland yesterday. He asks that an agreement to purchase a lot in Tuxedo Park, Winnipeg, be cancelled. Dr. Mills also asks for return of \$1700 which he has paid into the property.
