The CHOLERA.—This dreadful disease, made its appearance in Halifax, on the 5th day of August, 1834.—The number of deaths reported by the Board of Health, from that date to September 30—when reports ceased to be issued in consequence of the abatement of the disease-is 400. impossible to ascertain the number correctly, we may not be charged with But as it appears exaggeration in asserting that one-eighth more may be added to the number reported, which would swell it to about 450. The number of cases reported exceeded 1200.

Synney Mines.—There are at present about 300 men daily employed at the Mines and Rail Road, and about 200 are employed during the winter months. There were 14,966 chaldrons coal shipped in 1831; 19,957, in 1832; and 15,302 in 1838; total 50,225: averaging 16,742 chals yearly, for 3 years.

They do not raise more coal than is sufficient to keep a stock for one summer's shipping; but have capabilities of raising and shipping 40,000 chaldrons annually, which could be increased if required.—The present mines-windingengine is 24 horse power, depth of shaft 60 yards; another 20 horse power winding-engine is being erected; and a 70 horse power pumping engine will be put up next summer ; depth of shaft 112 yards.

There is a large Foundry for either iron or brass, with a 20 horse power engine, and a blowing apparatus equal to 15 horse power; it also drives a circular saw, turns a lathe, and pumps; is intended to drive one gang of 8 saws and another of 2 saws ; can also be connected to a boring apparatus, capable

of boring cylinders, &c. up to 3 feet 6 inches diameter.
