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QUEBEC SOUTHERN SOLD Bank of St. Hyacinthe Buys It For \$1,051,000.

MONTREAL, Nov. 8. (Special.)—Judge Barthelemy this morning handed out a decision in the sale of the Quebec Southern railway, accepting the single bid of Senator Beliveau for \$1,051,000 for the whole system. Single bids for two sections totalled \$1,000,000, but the court held the single bid was more in the interest of the creditors owing to the loss favored in the alternative. An appeal will be entered.

McCLELLAN EVIDENTLY ELECTED; TAMMANY HALL IS BARELY BUMPED

Hearst Says He is Not Defeated--He Charges Fraud and Will Demand a Re-count, and if Necessary Carry the Case to the Courts --- William Travers Jerome Re-elected as District Attorney--Reform Party Carries Philadelphia --- 'Twas a Bad Day for the Grafters Yesterday in New York, Philadelphia, Cincinnati and Some Other Cities--Tammany Also Loses Board of Aldermen.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—Election day came to a close with a dramatic scene at the Hoffman House, where Wm. R. Hearst gathered his friends and advisers around him to begin the preparation of his legal contest of the return which indicated the success of the Democratic opponent, George B. McClellan.

As the vote came in showing McClellan's majority, Hearst being only a few thousand, it was noticed that figures from some of the East Side districts were missing. Mr. Hearst said he was being cheated out of a hard and honestly won victory and announced his intention to make a contest in the courts.

He sent out a call to one of the managers of the law committee of the Municipal Ownership League and soon they began to arrive, many of them in evening clothes, they having been found at social gatherings on the evening of the election.

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At an early hour this morning, William R. Hearst left his headquarters in the Hoffman House for his residence following a conference with his companions and managers and the heads of the Municipal Ownership League ticket.

Mr. Hearst himself would make no statement and referred all questions to Max F. Himm. The latter said that Mr. Hearst claimed his election as mayor by a good majority. That a fraudulent vote of at least 40,000 had been cast in Greater New York, was the claim of the Hearst managers.

It has been decided, Mr. Himm said, to demand a recount of the entire ticket, if after the 104 missing ballot boxes have been located and counted, it was found Mr. Hearst still lacked sufficient votes to elect him.


It must have been that these boxes contained many Hearst votes, Mr. Himm declared, otherwise they would not be missing. Certain it is that they would not carry away boxes containing a majority of McClellan votes.

But one thing is certain, Mr. Hearst will demand a proper re-count even should the vote in these missing boxes elect him. It is also certain that we will carry this matter to the court as a last resort, if necessary. Mr. Hearst feels that he has been cheated and that a majority of the citizens of New York have cast votes for him and he proposes to have these votes re-counted as well as the many thousands of illegal votes thrown out. We have evidence of many thousands of these votes.

Clearing up this morning to comment on the result of the voting. It was explained for him that the polling was so close he realized that a contest would be made and that, while he was confident that the ultimate decision would be in favor of Mayor McClellan, he thought it would be out of place for him to say anything.

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TYPHOON DID GREAT DAMAGE



WANT LOWER RATE

MONTREAL, Nov. 8. (Special.)—The Dominion Cigar Manufacturers' Association was the chief interest heard by the tariff commission this morning. The request of the cigar men was for a reduction in duties on foreign leaf. At present the combined customs and excise tax amounts to \$1 per thousand on cigars manufactured from leaf, and demand is that tax be reduced to 50c per thousand.

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STRIKE MAY BE SERIOUS

Three Hundred Leather Cutters Who Struck in Montreal May Tie Up 7,000 Workmen.

MONTREAL, Nov. 8. (Special.)—A general strike of leather cutters has been declared in the city. Three hundred men are affected directly and the strike may tie up 7,000 other leather workers who depend on the cutters for materials. Three firms which have an agreement with the union are excluded.

SEAMAN HURT

One of the Crew of the Bark Egeria Hurt While Going on Board the Vessel.
