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

**DIAMONDS CARRIED
ON THE DEUTSCHLAND**Desire to Dispose of Gems From
Former Colony in Africa One
of Chief Reasons For Submarine
Trip?

London, July 18.—A despatch to The Chronicle from Amsterdam says that the real significance of the German submarine Deutschland's voyage to America

will probably be found to lie in the one word "diamonds." It will be seen later, the despatch says, that the voyage marks the accomplishment of a purpose which the Allies hitherto were able largely to thwart and to control. It had long been the object of Germany to realize the value of the huge stock of diamonds from her late colony in South-west Africa.

Stringent measures had been taken in Holland to prevent the exportation of these German diamonds. Experts were constantly examining the stores in order to decide the place of origin of diamonds intended for export. Nevertheless some German diamonds have been smuggled out of Holland for America.



**Liberal Advisory Committee
Discusses National Problems**Representative Men From All Parts of
Dominion Confer With Sir Wilfrid Laurier;
Party United on Great War Issues

(Special to The Telegraph.)

Ottawa, July 18.—Some two-score of representative Liberals from all parts of the dominion assembled in the capital today on the invitation of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, to advise with him as to the problems of Liberalism and the national work of the party in dealing with present problems of statehood, and in preparing to meet the problems which must come up for solution as soon as the war is over. The Liberals present are members of the national Liberal advisory committee, formed a year ago on the suggestion of Sir Wilfrid, and organized at last year's meeting into committees for the study of the various problems of constructive statehood. Since then, each committee has been at work securing data and advising as to the best means of furthering national interests and preparing the way for the assumption of administrative and legislative responsibility when the Liberal party is again entrusted with office at the federal capital.

Today's meeting was confined largely to general discussions of the various matters of national policy which have been before parliament during the past few sessions and which are looming up for consideration next session.

It goes without saying that the Liberal representatives met with absolute confidence in the leadership of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and with absolute confidence also that it would not be long before he would again lead a Liberal government in Canada. Tomorrow the resolutions prepared by the various committees which met separately this afternoon and this evening will be considered by the full council and passed upon. These resolutions will outline as nearly as possible the general principles upon which Liberalism is agreed in matters of national concern.

The War.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier in opening the proceedings this morning declared that on the greatest of all questions now before the country, namely the successful prosecution of the war to a triumphant conclusion, all Liberals were united. He declared that the party from end to end of Canada could be depended upon to continue in the future as in the past, cordial support of every national war effort and every proper war measure. He regretted that it had been necessary for some of the government's acts. But the result of that criticism and of the investigations which had been held had amply justified in the public mind the attitude taken by the opposition in parliament.

Touching briefly on some of the problems which had to be dealt with, Sir

Wilfrid mentioned the transportation question, the general financial position of the dominion, the conservation and development of natural resources, and the latest question of the safeguarding of Canada's nickel resources against exportation by the enemy and for its development in Canada.

**CLOSING OF HALIFAX
SALOONS HAS EFFECT
ON GENERAL BUSINESS**Money Now Going For Clothing
and Food; Conditions in Nova
Scotia

Halifax, July 17.—All misgivings concerning the harvest are at an end. The whole Dominion promises a bountiful crop and this province will not be behind the others.

Travelers report a loosening up already and a good autumn trade is anticipated.

It is gratifying to note that there has been no falling off in industrial activity during the past fortnight. Indeed, the reports from the larger manufacturing centres are of the most encouraging nature.

Labor is still in demand throughout the province. The farmers complain that there is very little help offering. So many of the young men of the farm have gone to the front and so many of the many men who usually took up this line of work during harvest time have also gone with the colors, that the farmer is almost entirely left to his own resources. This, however, may right itself in time.

The farmer is by means alone in this particular. Skilled workmen are scarce and wages are high. There are no idle men in the towns or villages and there are none in the city. Every man who wants to work can do so and at good wages.

In Halifax city there is very little change to report. Times are good, even better than a fortnight ago. The closing up of the liquor saloons has had a marked effect so far as the retail stores are concerned. The people who formerly spent money for intoxicants are now investing it in food and clothing. The number of men thrown out of employment by the closing up of the liquor establishments has not made a dent in the

labor market, as there is work for all in other lines of endeavor.

Building operations continue good, particularly in the western and northwestern part of the city. New residences appear to spring up over night, but the demand is far from being satisfied.

Retail merchants report business as good as at this time last year, if not better. There seems to be plenty of money in circulation and people seem to buy what they want. On the whole, the situation is good and there is every indication of a good autumn trade.

To Enlarge U. S. Navy

Washington, July 18.—The senate today adopted the enlarged building programme of the naval bill by viva voce vote. It provides for the construction, within three years, of 187 war vessels of all classes, and for four dreadnoughts and four battle cruisers, to be built next year.

Fanatic Kills Four

Chicago, July 18.—A negro religious fanatic, H. J. McIntyre, becoming violently insane today, shot four persons to death, wounded three, and was himself killed, with his wife, after 150 police had dynamited the house in which he was barricaded.

The police found an explanation of McIntyre's deed in a note which he left scrawled in lead pencil on a soiled piece of wrapping paper.

"The Almighty God has made me a prophet unto all nations and also my wife, Hattie McIntyre," ran the note.

"You shall know that the Lord has sent me to gather unto the Lord the remnant of the Odoonite seed."
