

## NOT TO RECOGNIZE SUSPENSION ORDER OF MASSACHUSETTS

Trenton, N. J., April 19.—The suspension by the Massachusetts Boxing Commission of Fred Fulton and Floyd Johnson, heavyweight pugilists who are matched to box in Jersey City next Monday night, would not be recognized by the New Jersey Boxing Commission, it was announced today by Allan Trimble, secretary of the commission. The Massachusetts Commission,

which suspended Johnson, Fulton and their managers for failure to keep an alleged contract with the Arena A. C. of Boston asked that its decision be also enforced in this state.

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## DEMAR WINS THE BOSTON MARATHON

Melrose Runner Establishes  
Record in Third Win—  
Spragg Unable to Start.

Clarence H. De Mar of Melrose, won the Boston marathon yesterday in 2 hours, 23 minutes and 47.3 seconds. This is his third win of the Marathon and by so doing established an unprecedented record. Frank Zuna of the Millrose A. A. of New York, finished second nearly two minutes behind the winner. The only Canadian to finish was Edward Fabre who finished eleventh. Instead of stopping at the tape he maintained his sprint right to the club house, up two flights of stairs and through the gymnasium to the lunch counter where he seized a bowl of pea soup. George W. Spragg of this city was unable to start owing to an injury he received last Monday when he was struck by an automobile while going over the course. This was a great disappointment to his many friends here who were anxiously waiting to see how he would make out. Victor McAuley of Windsor, N. S., started but had to stop after going eight miles as a result of a sprained tendon.

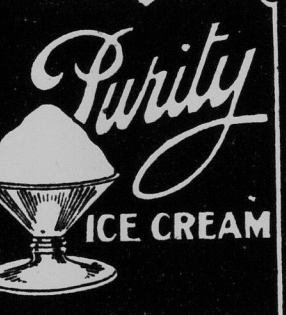
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## KING OF ITALY ATTENDS DERBY IN OWN COUNTRY

## TRAFFIC COURT CALLS COHEN, FIVE IN WILD RUSH TO RESPOND

The Cohens had a bad day in the Traffic Court yesterday. Five were fined same varying from \$2 to \$5 for violations of traffic regulations, and court attendants had to threaten them with jail terms when, as the magistrate announced "I'll next hear the case of Cohen," they arose as one and upset the legal machinery in a dash through the crowded courtroom. Magistrate Norman J. Marsh and W. Bruce Cobb disposed of 379 other cases during the day, a record, and after assessing the offenders from \$2 to \$25, for a total of \$1,600, sent thirty chauffeurs to jail from two to ten days because they couldn't pay their fines.

Women's Residence at Queen's.  
Kingston, April 20.—It is announced that the Queen's Alumnae Association has raised \$75,000 for a women's residence which it hoped to make start on the erection of the building this fall. The building will give accommodation for up to 65 girls, while the dining room will have seating capacity for 125.

Rothsay avenue was closed yesterday to heavy trucks by order of the Public Works Department. Provincial Constable Robert Crawford was on duty on the road and turned back several vehicles. He was at his post again today, and says that any one trying to pass will be reported. The restrictions will remain in force until the frost comes out of the ground.

## DIVORCE CASES DROP IN ENGLAND AND WALES

Decline of 33 Per Cent. in 1921 From 1920 Is Highlighted as Encouraging Sign.

London, April 20.—Domestic felicity is steadily gaining strength in England and Wales if recently published statistics regarding divorce may be taken as a criterion. During 1921 the number of divorces in these countries declined by thirty-three per cent. This is regarded as a most encouraging showing as compared with the previous year, when the matrimonial suits brought into court showed an increase of 365 per cent. over the pre-war totals.

In recent years additional legal facilities have been accorded to poor persons seeking divorce in England, and this has brought a large increase in the number of divorces. During the last nine years 24,209 matrimonial suits were filed. Of the 3,461 suits entered in 1921, 1,702 petitions were filed by husbands and 1,759 by wives. In ninety-five per cent. of the cases the petitioners were successful. Of the parties concerned in the total number of suits for the year under survey, 3,282 were bachelors and 3,381 were spinsters at the date of the marriage, but by far the greater proportion were married at ages between twenty-one and thirty. The proportion of childless marriages was high, reaching a total of nearly 2,000.

Professional men head the list in the number of divorces, with 1,146 cases, while the clergy is at the bottom of the table, with only six. Army officers, soldiers and sailors figured in 241 cases, actors in 105, physicians in 79, schoolmasters in 18, and journalists in 15.
