FINE DRAMA AT OPERA HOUSE  
"Man Who Came Back" Thrills Many With Highly Dramatic Scenes.  
In a play this week that calls for a greater degree of histrionic talent than any the company has yet put before a St. John audience the F. James Carroll Players ably sustain the reputation which has earned for them almost capacity houses for nine performances a week. This week they present "The Man Who Came Back." It is a play in five episodes, carrying the audience from New York to San Francisco, on to Shanghai, then to Hongkong, and finally back to New York. Two years and six months are occupied from outset to close and every scene is replete with action and acting of an unusually high order of merit.
