### WOOL PRICES HIGHER.

Ottawa, Sept. 30.—A tendency on the part of sellers to advance prices on wool is reported by the Department of Agriculture in a bulletin covering the wool market for the week ended September 27. This has come as a result of general buying activity in the wool trade, and the United States. Buyers, however, although apparently willing to deal on the low level of prices, have been slow to meet the new prices asked, and sales have been slow at the higher quotations. The evident shortage of this year's cotton crop, continues the bulletin, and the already appreciable advance in prices for British tops and yarns is creating a stronger undertone to wool prices, and it would appear only a matter of time until buyers will have to meet the prices demanded by sellers.

Toronto, Sept. 30.—The will of the late Lionel H. Clarke, lieutenant governor of Ontario, who died on August 29, has been filed in the probate court, and personal property totals \$321,938.

Victoria, B. C., Sept. 30.—Fremat, an Indian of the Kiyuquot reservation, west coast, it is reported, has run amuck and it alleged to have killed Mrs. and Mrs. G. M. Chimsisky, and a man named Constance, on the reserve, all Indians. Owing to the isolation of Kiyuquot, it has not been easy to secure information.

**KNITTED WEAR MILLS HUM.** Flow of Orders Puts Philadelphia Plants on Double Shifts.

Philadelphia, Sept. 30.—Textile industries in Kensington and affiliated trades throughout the city are beginning to hum with activity as a result of increased business, giving employment to thousands of persons and making necessary double shifts in several plants. A survey of conditions, particularly in the sweater and hosiery trades, indicates these are fast recovering and are beginning to enjoy prosperous days. Virtually every one of the scores of knitted underwear mills in the city is busy, many of them night and day, working on orders that are pouring in. The demand for women's sweaters has caught manufacturers four months behind in production, and every effort is being made to catch up.

Despite a strike since the first of the year, hosiery mills report improved business conditions and increased production compared with early this year. Most of them are working on an open shop basis. The unusual and growing demand for full fashioned silk hosiery has led several of the mills to maintain double shifts.

All signs point to great activity in the forty or more knitted wear mills in this city, at least until Christmas, according to Frederick Mayer, president of the Philadelphia Knitted Underwear Manufacturers' Association. He said the present activity is greater than it has been in the last ten years.

At the closing session of the New Brunswick Board of the Retail Merchants' Association yesterday at Fredericton a resolution was passed favoring uniformity throughout Canada in regard to the early closing act. The establishment of a uniform credit rating system for the dominion was recommended. A resolution touching upon the matter of

preferential treatment given purchasers, including departmental stores by wholesalers, was withdrawn after much discussion. Miss F. P. Alward, of St. John, who was declared to be one of the most efficient of the provincial secretaries, and A. H. Milton, of Moncton, were re-appointed, secretary and provincial organizer, respectively.
