30,000 STEEL WORKERS WILL BE AFFECTED

Will Schedule Before Iron, Steel and Tin Workers' Convention—International President Speaks on the Matter.

SMILTON, Ont., May 3.—(By Associated Press)—A new wage scale and agreement for the independent mills of the United States will be the most important matter before the convention of Iron, Steel and Tin Workers, which opened here today with representatives of 30,000 steel workers at the wage scale adopted by the union will only directly affect the workers with which the Amalgamated has deals, Michael Tighe, international president, pointed out this morning.

Mr. Tighe declined to indicate the probable action of the convention. "We cannot tell until our wage committee reports what the men want," he explained. "Some lodges may recommend increases or continuance of the old scale. Our committee has been sifting out the various resolutions and will present a concrete proposal."

"The Amalgamated during the time of the present agreement has maintained most cordial relations with the steel companies," Mr. Tighe said. "We have an exceptionally smooth-working contract, providing for wage reductions or increases according to business conditions as shown by the companies' books. The employers have adhered to our agreement and we have had little trouble in making adjustments."

"While our men have taken reductions in many cases their wage is still considerably above the pre-war basis. Because of depressed industrial conditions, Mr. Tighe said, the attendance at the convention was not expected to be as large as in past years."

"Thousands of our men are out of work," he said, "and many of the independent companies have closed down or are working at greatly reduced capacity. Conditions are the worst we have experienced in years. Not only independent but the plants of the United States Steel Corporation have been working at about 80 per cent, or less, of their capacity."

The convention, which will probably continue for nearly three weeks, will be executive sessions unless a new rule is adopted, opening the meetings to the public. Mr. Tighe said that he favors "open sessions" and such action may be taken.

Important amendments to the by-laws and constitution of the Amalgamated are also to be considered during the sessions as well as other resolutions affecting the welfare of the organization.

Resolutions tending to support the campaign of the Executive Council of National and International organizations in the steel industry to unionize the plants of the United States Steel Corporation, headed by Mr. Tighe, will launch its active campaign on June 19.

MANY THOUSANDS OF U. S. MARINE WORKERS STRIKE

(Canadian Press Despatch) Washington, May 2.—Announcing a policy of no compromise on the question of a fifteen per cent wage reduction in the settlement of the controversy between the United States Shipping Board, ship owners and Marine workers, Chairman Nelson tonight called upon "all loyal citizens to rally to the support of their flag."

"Full protection," he said, "both now and after the controversy is settled, will be given by the shipping board to all those who come to its assistance in keeping the ships in operation."

Economic conditions fully justify, he said, readjustment in wage scales.

General Walk-Out Begins.

New York, May 2.—The suggestion of Secretary Hoover that the controversy over a wage contract between steamship owners and the unions of engineers, firemen and seamen be submitted to arbitration by a committee of three men, not government officers, was rejected here tonight by the American Steamship Owners' Association.

The action of the steamship owners closed what was intended to be an opening for an adjustment of a country-wide strike, involving thousands of employees on a majority of United States ships on the Atlantic, Pacific and Gulf coasts.

Walk-outs in response to the calls of the union leaders began in all ports today. In New York more than 100 ships were directly affected, on all of which at least some of the men walked out.

Reports to the Steamship Owners' Association were that many of the engineers were remaining loyal to the companies and refusing to leave. Of these ships more than a dozen are passenger liners, one of which in the Transatlantic trade is scheduled to sail tomorrow for London. The Mallory, Southern Pacific and other coastwise lines received notice from many of their men that they would respond to the call of their unions.

Winthrop L. Marvin, general manager of the Steamship Owners' Association, estimates that 65,000 men would be concerned in the strike. The estimate of the union leaders places the number at over 125,000.

VILLA'S LATEST WHIM Seeks Governorship and Has Fun With Officials

MEXICO CITY, May 3.—Francisco Villa, former rebel chieftain, now holds absolute title to his ranch in the state of Durango. Final payment of \$500,000 pesos to the former owners of the ranch was ordered by President Obregon last week.

Villa's activities have figured conspicuously in newspapers here recently, it being declared that he seeks the governorship of the state of Durango. His crops are all planted and the harvest is several weeks away, and it is said the former bandit leader seeks diversion and will wage an active campaign for political honors. Newspapers here also assert he was recently approached by agents of men planning revolutionary activities who sought his aid. Villa is reported, however, to have sent the agents away with a curt answer, and to have resumed the dispatching of humorous postcards to Government officials here, which appears to be his latest whim.
