POLICE COURT SITS AT EARLY HOUR

Prisoner Charged With Automobile Theft — Revolver Case Brought Up — Further Charge Against Vail.

The morning session of the police court was held this morning at 6 o'clock and the arrests last night were rudely awakened at this early hour to appear before the magistrate and answer to their misdemeanors. Elijah Vail, aged thirty-one, was charged with having in his possession a loaded revolver. He pleaded guilty and was remanded. Later in the morning Sergeant Rankine came to central police station and laid an additional charge of pointing a revolver at Charles Bell and ordering him to put up his hands while wearing a mask. Both charges will be dealt with at a hearing next week.

Murdoch McLellan and Alward Cheeseman were charged with breaking and entering the garage of John J. Sullivan, 219 Main street, and stealing an automobile valued at \$1,800, the property of Mr. Sullivan. They were not asked to plead to the charge but were remanded. The arrests were made by Policemen Gibbs and Howard.

One man, charged with drunkenness, pleaded guilty and was remanded.

IN IRELAND

Dublin, July 30.—One civilian and three military police were wounded outside the Bank of Ireland last night. Their injuries were received in a scuffle following upon an attempt made to disarm five military police.

Two military lorries carrying armed soldiers from Mill street to Ballingary were captured by Sinn Fein soldiers and taken to the mountains. The lorries were burned.

In a fight between soldiers and Irish volunteers at Brurea, County Limerick, last evening, one soldier was shot dead. It is reported that five other deaths resulted from the fighting, but of this there is no confirmation.

Must Stay in Empire.

London, July 29.—Whatever happened, said Lord George, Ireland could not be allowed to leave the Empire. Munitions would be sent, and railway men refusing to handle them would be instantly dismissed. In reply to a question as to whether generous treatment would be accorded Ireland beyond the present home rule bill after she had been pacified, the premier said, that his definition of what Ireland ought to have was in accordance with the provisions of the Home Rule Bill.

Lieutenant Killed.

Dublin, July 30.—Frank Brooke, deputy lieutenant for County Wicklow, Leinster province, was shot dead at the Westland road station, Dublin, last morning just after alighting from a train. His assailants escaped.

RED CROSS HOSPITAL COMMITTEE MEETS

The meeting of the hospital committee of the Montreal Red Cross Society was held in the Red Cross rooms in Chipman Hill this morning at 10 o'clock with the president, Mrs. V. Y. Anglin in the chair. Reports were received as to the work carried on during the last month. The East St. John and the Leinster hospitals received four packages of tobacco per week besides fruit and candy as the comforts regularly supplied by the Red Cross. The recreation room at River Glade was furnished and automobiles supplied for drives each week at the three hospitals in the city.

Five hundred cigarettes were placed on board the Pullman taking the military patients from the provincial hospital to the Montreal special hospital. Arrangements have been made whereby the committee will till its share in making the Red Cross booth an attraction at the coming exhibition. The Ashmun branch at Fredericton has been asked to co-operate.

The monthly indent for hospital supplies, which was presented to be filled by the committee. The forming of a "follow up" committee was laid over till next meeting, so many ladies being out of town at the present time. The session was adjourned to meet on the last Friday in August.

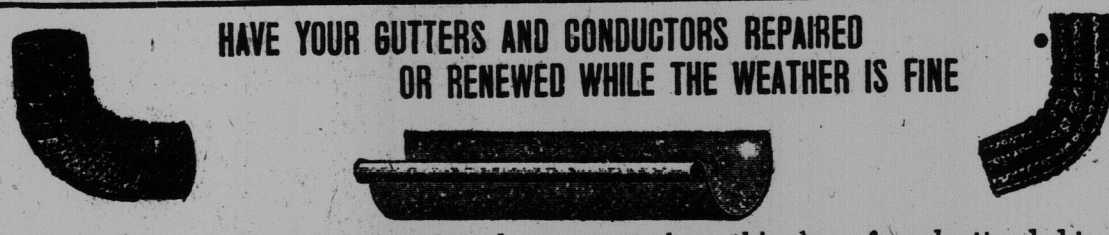
