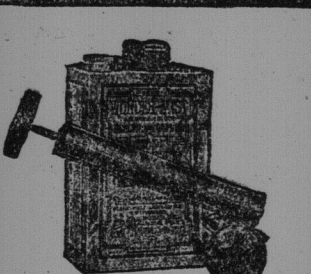
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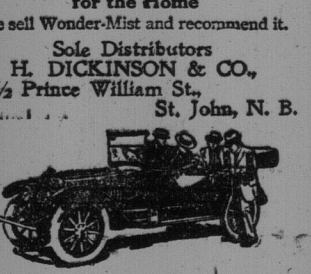

Will Not Extend Season—The Division of the World Series Pool

New York, July 17.—The extension of the 140 games schedule was decided at a meeting of the National League here today. There was an unanimous vote in favor of the recently revised rules for the division of the world series proceeds. If the American League takes similar action the division of the players' pool next October will be as follows:

Seventy-five per cent to be divided, sixty per cent to the winners and forty per cent to the losers with the remaining twenty-five per cent divided among the players of the second and third teams of the two leagues.

Further exhibition games between teams of the National League during the remainder of the season were prohibited with the exception of one contest already scheduled between Boston and Chicago for Syracuse some time in August.

A communication from the minor leagues' organization was discussed and it was unanimously resolved not to enter into any formal agreement with the minor leagues unless the right of the major leagues to draw players from the minors was included so as to enable baseball players to advance in their profession as provided for in the present national agreement.

At a subsequent meeting of the board of the directors of the league it was decided to expunge from the record the second game of July 6 between Pittsburgh and Cincinnati at Cincinnati and the teams were ordered to replay the contest on July 27, July 28 or August 31. Attention was called to this contest by the New York club which alleged a violation of the league constitution on the ground that the game was called early in order that Pittsburgh might catch a train when there were nine innings which would have carried the team to its next destination after a full nine inning contest had been played. Cincinnati won by a score of 2 to 0, the game being called at the end of the seventh inning by agreement. As a result of today's decision one victory is subtracted from the Cincinnati club record to date and one defeat removed from Pittsburgh's record.

AUSTRALIAN TENNIS
PLAYERS MISSED STEAMER

Will Not Be Able to Participate in Eastern Doubles Championship Tournament

Boston, July 18.—The Australian tennis team, headed by Norman K. Brooks, will not reach this country in time to participate in the eastern doubles championship tournament, which begins at the Longwood Cricket Club next week. Efforts are under way, however, to make it possible for them to attempt qualification for the national doubles title in a later sectional tournament.

Secretary Richard Bishop, of the Massachusetts Tennis Association, had announced today that the Australians were en route to America and would be here in time to compete in the eastern tournament. Later, however, he said they had missed the steamship Aquitania and had cabied that they were sailing on the Adriatic, due in New York on July 28. United States Lawn Tennis Association officials were requested by Secretary Bishop, in response to a request contained in the cablegram, to arrange for

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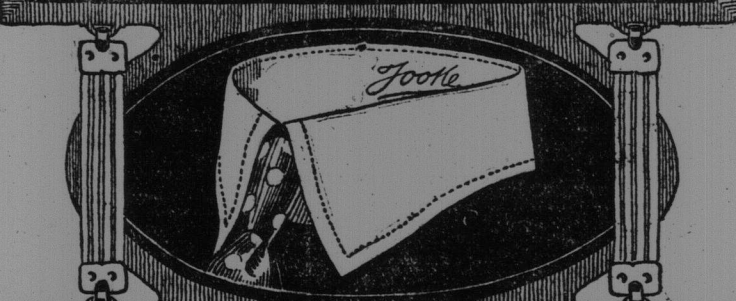
