of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada took place Saturday afternoon at Lansdowne Park, being held under the auspices of the newly organized Ottawa Federation of Amateur Athletes. One Canadian record was broken during an afternoon of the finest track and field sport that has ever been witnessed in the capital, John Cameron, a husky police officer from Vancouver, carried off the all-around championship with thirteen points, while second honors went to W. H. Kennedy, of Montreal A. A. A., who scored ten.

The team championship was carried off by the M. A. A., which had little or no opposition, and the only championship to remain in Ottawa was the half mile title, which went to Reid Tubman, his only rival in this race being his brother Ray. The championship meeting passed off without a hitch. Competent officials handled the programme of events in good style and though there were one or two delays, these proved unavoidable. Less than two thousands people attended the games.

It was obvious, however, that the five years suspension of operations had a great effect, for the entry list was much smaller than in the days before the outbreak of war. Pat Ryan and James O'Brien, both from the Loughlin Lyceum A. A., of New York City, were the only American contestants entered, while the far west sent only John Cameron, the new all-around champion, and Lee Cowan, a promising colored sprinter. Tom Toms was here from Winnipeg, and Montreal sent up a large delegation, but the Toronto team was minus Jack Tressider and other stars who should be expected, and Hamilton was not represented at all.

T. A. Baker, Halifax, won second place in the shot putting event, throwing a distance of 42 feet 3/4 inches. The winner in this event was J. Cameron, of Vancouver.

The pole vault is undecided, W. Halpenny, Montreal, and L. MacDonnell, Picton, tying for first place. Each vaulted eleven feet six inches. Kennedy, Montreal, vaulted eleven feet seven inches, but was disqualified because he climbed the pole.

A delegation representing the Canadian Amateur Athletic Union, waited on Sir Henry Drayton, minister of finance, Saturday and asked a grant of \$30,000 towards financing Canada's proposed Olympic team. Their request was promised consideration.

**New Record at Charlottetown.**  
Charlottetown, P. E. I., Sept. 27—A new trotting record was established for the Charlottetown track at today's races, the second time the track record was broken during this week's meet which closed today. Yesterday Brage reduced it from 2.15 1/2 to 2.13 1/2. Today Colorado L. in the first heat of the 2.22 trot brought it down to 2.13. In the next heat Colorado finished fifth. This did not satisfy the grand stand and it clamored for Kelly's removal. field seats, known as the bleachers, have no roof shelter. Box seats extend along the entire front of both floors of the grand stand proper. The press box is on the upper deck of the grand stand, but it was not considered large enough to accommodate all of the newspaper men and telegraph operators reporting the world series games, so extra seats with a temporary covering have been built on the roof of the stand for the working newspaper men.

Five street car lines are routed by way of the ball park, while there is another square away. The ball park can be reached in twenty minutes by street car from the heart of the city. The playing field is the place of Gary Hermann, president of the club and chairman of the National Baseball Commission. It lies about eight feet below the stands with a slight embankment along the left field extending to the fence enclosure. Left field is shorter than the home plate than is the right field. Right field is the sun field and many players have found it difficult to judge flies batted in that direction.

General admission and prices fixed by the National Baseball Commission will prevail at the world series games. The Cincinnati club management had announced a scheme for distribution of 10,000 reserved tickets for public sale that virtually is a plan of placing the names of applicants in some sort of a receptacle and then drawing them out until all 10,000 had been drawn.
