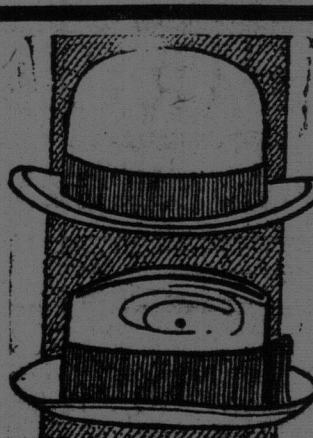
GETS WORD FROM BOSTON.

IN THE COURTS.

Hearing in the case of Robert L. Todd vs. the Farm Settlement Board et al, was held before Chief Justice Barker in the Chancery division this morning on motion of M. G. Teed, K. C., for the defendant, to set aside an injunction restraining the defendants from cancelling an agreement of sale with the plaintiff of a farm in the Parish of St. Stephen, Charlotte County, on the ground that the plaintiff did not work a farm in a proper manner as set out in the agreement. Mr. Mullin, K. C., argued for the plaintiff, and His Honor announced that he would give judgment on Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

King's Bench Division.  
The case of George B. Cronwell vs. Mrs. Margaret Bell came up on certiorari this morning before Mr. Justice McKewen. This action was commenced by Mrs. Bell, who claimed that the price of stove which the plaintiff said were to be paid for, over and above the purchase price of a house sold to the defendant. The defendant denied the claim. There was a verdict for the defendant, and on review, before Judge Forbes, the judgment was set aside, and a verdict entered for the plaintiff. After hearing argument this morning His Honor reserved judgment. George H. V. Belyea is for the plaintiff, and S. B. Bustin for the defendant.

BIG AWARD BECAUSE OF A "FAKE" FILM.  
Albany, N. Y., Jan. 3.—"Jack" Binn, wireless operator here of the steamer Republic disaster in 1909, will receive \$15,000 because a moving picture concern exploited a fake portrait of him. The court of appeals has upheld the judgment for that amount obtained against a company. Two days after the collision the company showed a moving picture of the accident with a portrait of Binn.

Offers to Sell Husband.  
Boston, Mass., Jan. 3.—Mrs. Agnes Bedell, of Quincy, wrote Miss Mary E. Chandler, offering to sell her husband to the maiden, who she heard needed a man to care for her property. She asked \$1,000 cash.

Mrs. Chandler in making public the letter, said she would consider the offer. Mrs. Bedell declared she would rather have the money than her husband.

Former Stock Exchange President.  
New York, Jan. 3.—William Lannan Bull, former broker and ex-president of the New York stock exchange, died last night, aged 70.
