Conservative Toronto Telegram Sends Hot Shot into the Borden Government

## JAP TROOPS AT MUKDEN

Shanghai, Oct. 25.—A report that 10,000 Japanese troops have arrived at Mukden, Manchuria, is causing uneasiness among the supporters of the revolution, who believe that the Japanese are about to aid the Manchurian government. The Japanese authorities here explain that if such a movement has been made in Manchuria, the only purpose is to protect Japanese residents and property, and railway interests. It is reported that the plague has broken out on the Siberian border of Manchuria and that a quarantine has been established.

## Portugal and The Church

Lisbon, Oct. 25.—The Patriarch of Lisbon has sent to the Vatican a list of 2150 priests, who are accepting a pension from the government, and the names of 3200 who have refused this aid. Of the latter, 2400 are destitute.

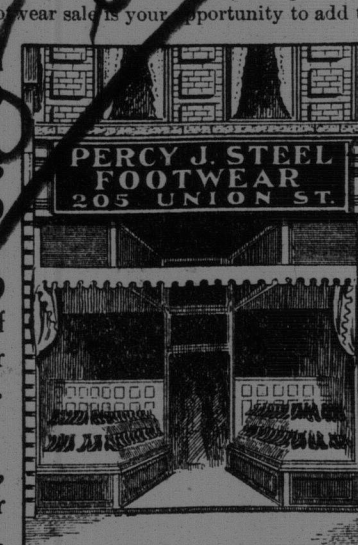
