Wall Street Notes.
New York, Aug. 29—Americans steady and strong.
Directors of L. & N. meet today. They are expected to authorize capital stock increase.
General Electric Company's stockholders vote today to increase capital stock to \$100,000,000.
Engineers in their brief filed with arbitration board say railroads have doctored wages figures and have not taken into account that tonnage has increased 100 p. c. in the last ten years.
President Taft receives order for despatching troops to Nicaragua.
Last time Bank of England raised its discount rate in August was in 1907 and before that in 1900.
With the shipment of \$1,200,000 gold to the interior can be said to have set in and the movement for the next six weeks is likely to be quite large and our banks are not too well supplied to meet the demand.
The Vermont election comes on Sept. 3 and is the first shower of politics, Maine following the week after.
The large interests evidently do not want any great activity at the moment. Some of them are arranging to transfer their speculative commitments to London as money rates are likely to favor them.
Commission houses have less stocks and people who have them are holding them.
Today's market is likely to be affected in some way by the Bank of England's action toward the money market, but do not look for any particular weakness. A conservative course seems best.

IN PRISON BUT HE MAKES A MILLION

Joseph A. Roblin, Former Banker, Said to Have Had Office Connected With Wall Street

New York, Aug. 28.—Joseph G. Roblin, former president of the wrecked Northern Bank and self-confessed felon, has made another fortune of more than \$1,000,000 while spending the last year in the Tombs, according to the Globe, which asserts that Roblin was allowed a "private office" in the Tombs, equipped with a telephone and typewriter.
Instead of a cell the former banker had a room alongside the office of the district attorney's force, and there all day long he was in communication with his brokers and in touch with Wall Street, buying and selling huge blocks of stocks, and bonds. He occupied a cell at night.
Roblin is visited daily in his "office" by his sister, Dr. Louise Robinson, which was his name until he altered it.

HAD CLOSE CALL, SAYS CAPTAIN INGALLS

Grand Manan Man, Here Today, Tells of Collision of Schooners in Bay

Captain Irving Ingalls of the 34-foot schooner Helen and Jennie, which was sunk yesterday in a collision off the coast of Grand Manan yesterday morning, arrived in the city last night and is at the Victoria. To a Times reporter this morning Captain Ingalls said that it was nothing short of a miracle that the crew of the boat escaped with their lives. The collision happened between two and three o'clock in the morning. A dense fog prevailed and both the Helen and Jennie and the schooner Daniel Baker were cruising along very slowly.
Without a warning note the Baker struck the Helen and Jennie broadside and stove a big hole in the side. The schooner filled rapidly and soon sank. Captain Ingalls and his crew barely escaped to launch their gasoline boat and get away before the little schooner went down. All their belongings were lost.
The schooner Daniel Baker was not damaged and after standing by for a while, was able to proceed to her destination, Grand Manan.
The Helen and Jennie was bound from Grand Manan to this port with a small cargo of fish. She was schooner rigged, equipped with gasoline engine and was about sixty feet in length. The schooner that ran her down was considerably larger, and equipped with a fifty horse power engine.
Captain Ingalls said this morning that the boat and cargo were valued at between \$5,000 and \$10,000, and that there was no insurance on either. Captain Ingalls says the fog was exceptionally thick and made navigation difficult.

SAYS BECKER MADE HIS MONEY IN WALL STREET

New York, Aug. 28.—Jas. E. March, recognized leader of the Italian colony, and a power in politics, has surprised the district attorney's office by announcing that Lieut. Chas. Becker accumulated his money in Wall street, and not from gamblers who paid for protection.
March said that Becker worked together for months speculating in interior, Brooklyn Rapid Transit, and Erie, and cleaned up enormous profits. He said he had documentary evidence in the shape of letters to and from brokers, etc., that he would produce at Becker's trial.

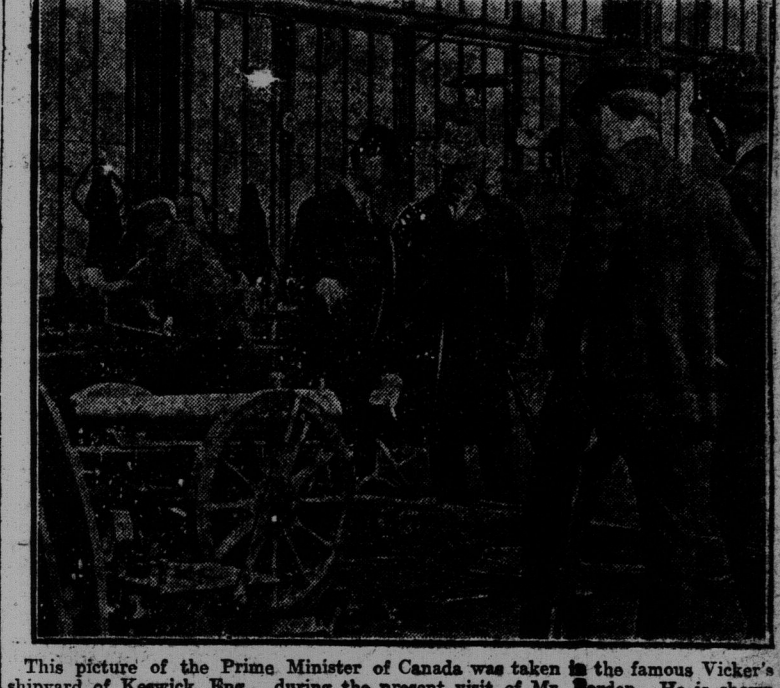
