ON BETTER TERMS WITH GERMANY
Significant Statement By High Official In England
EXPECTS 'GOOD NEWS'

(Canadian Press)
London, April 28—President last night over a meeting of the Anglo-American friendship committee, Lord Loreburn, lord high chancellor, made this significant statement: 'I believe within a short time we shall hear good news with regard to Germany.'

Lord Loreburn was relating how England had reached friendly terms with France, Russia and the United States, and expressed the hope that it would not be long before we would hear of a meeting similar in character to that held at the Guild Hall yesterday, which would record the fact that England had the same relations with Germany as with America.

Yesterday's Meeting
The meeting in the Guild Hall yesterday in support of President Taft's arbitration proposals and the speeches made by Premier Asquith and A. J. Balfour, attracted much attention in the morning newspapers, which publish long accounts of the meeting and almost all of which make editorial reference to it.
