N.H.L. Champions Wilt In Crucial Game Of Series

VICTORIA, B. C., March 31.—
(Canadian Press).—Victoria engraved its name upon the Stanley Cup here last night, by turning back the Montreal Canadiens in the fourth and deciding game of the world's series. The Cougars proved themselves worthy successors to the Frenchmen, as world's champions, by giving one of the greatest exhibitions of hockey ever seen in the west. The Canadiens, despite frantic efforts by their defensive and sparkling saves by Vezina, could not keep a check on the blue and gold band of Lester Patrick, and when the final bell sounded they had to gaze upon a six to one defeat.

Favorites In Betting.

After their reverse last Friday night, it was thought in many quarters, that the Cougars had cracked, after their strenuous campaign. This led to Canadiens being installed as favorites in the betting and it was expected that the series would be stretched out to the fifth game. Last night, however, the Cougars were in better form than at any time during the western play-off for the world's series.

Canadiens Outclassed.

Leo Dandurand, manager of the Canadiens, was the first man to break in the Cougars' dressing room at the conclusion of the game, and he shook hands with each player, and congratulated Lester Patrick.

"It was a marvellous exhibition by Victoria," said Leo, who was very gracious in defeat. "I did not think the west could furnish such opposition for us, and I was confident after our win on Friday, that we should win out. But, in the face of the exhibition Victoria gave tonight, we could not hope to win. We are outclassed."

Along The Sport Trail

ACCORDING TO reports from Chatham, horse racing enthusiasts are keen to re-establish the sport on a sound basis there this year. They intend putting their track in first class condition and are also talking of importing a fast free-for-all horse which will be able to hold its own on the Maine & New Brunswick circuit. This should act as a stimulus to local turf enthusiasts. It is time this city woke up. If we ever hope to surpass, or even hold our own, with smaller centres it is obvious that a Matinee Club or some other similar organization, should be formed. If it was composed of reputable citizens it would not be long before the sport would be re-established here on a sounder basis than ever before. At the present time Silas E. Rice and a few others can be thanked for keeping the racing game alive, but the burden is undoubtedly too heavy for them. The track needs a general overhauling and rebuilding and the stables are not what they should be. These could very easily be remedied and the game placed on a paying basis if an united effort was made. There is no question about patronage. Once the fans realize that they will see good racing, that reputable men are backing the sport and that some accommodation can be made to take them to and from the park, it is a safe bet that crowds will turn out. Now is the time to start, not when the season is at hand. Let's go.

Leonard is a clever pitcher and at times is very effective. If he can continue his good work this year and get his famous drop breaking properly he should help the Tigers in the pennant race.

THERE IS STILL considerable talk going the rounds about professional baseball, but there is nothing of a definite nature to report.
