BOARD OF TRADE COUNCIL

Government "Acknowledges" the Board's Request for Railway Subsidy.

Delegate to be Appointed to the Congress of Chambers of Commerce.

A meeting of the council of the British Columbia Board of Trade was held this morning, a number of important matters being considered.

The managing editor of the Journal of Commerce wrote asking the opinion of the board respecting the question of tak ing Newfoundland into the Dominion. On motion it was decided that with the limited information at the disposal of the board, the board prefers not to commit itself to an expression of opinion further than endorsing the scheme for the federation of the whole of the British North American possessions.

J. S. K. de Knevet, agent general for British Columbia at Brussels, forwarded some Belgian books for the reading room. Received with thanks.

Capt. John Irving, of the committee on harbors and navigation, to whom was handed a letter from Capt. Clarke, harbor-master, respecting a light on Fiddle reef, recommended that the board submit to the department the feasibility of both Trial island and Fiddle reef lights. attaching the board's recommendation to the lights which they prefer for the greatest utility. Tabled.

The secretary of the third congress of the chambers of commerce of the empire wrote that the congress would meet in London in June, 1896, and setting forth the good that previous sessions had The secretary was instructed to ac

knowledge the letter, stating that a delegate would be appointed by the board. T. B. Hall declined the appointment of trustee of the board and J. H. Todd was elected in his place.

A number of letters were received respecting the resolution of the board asking the Dominion government to grant a subsidy of \$3200 a mile for the extensio of the E. & N. railway to Comox. The department of railways and canals acknowledged receipt of the board's tele-gram and letter. The secretary of the New Westminster board wrote stating that that board had taken no action to wards endorsing the resolution asking for the subsidy, not being sufficiently acquainted with the circumstances. The Nanaimo board endorsed the resolution, adding as a rider that if the subsidy was granted the E. & N. railway should throw open their lands to actual settlers. at \$1 an acre. The Nanaimo Loard asked the B. C. board to endorse the tider. The Vancouver board did not endorse the resolution on account of the "absence of any definite information."
