FRENCH WARNING.

Alleges Britain Intends to Seize Spanish Territory in the Event of War.

New York, Feb. 20.-A special cable from Berlin to the Herald says:
"According to a telegram from the Madrid correspondent of the Berliner Tageblatt the French government has confidentially given warning to the Spanish cabinet of the secret plans of the British government to seize parts of Spanish territory in the case of war.

"This is the reason why Spain is send-ing troops to the Canary islands, Ceuta, Galacia and the neighborhood of the Straits of Gibraltar. The French gov ernment has also advised the strengthening of the fortifications on certain parts of the Spanish coast.

Baron Rischth, minister of foreign affairs, says that in view of the outbreak of war it is impossible for Germany to withdraw the 2,600 men she has in China, and at Kado. WILL RENEW ATTEMPT.

Russian Vladivostock Squadron Will Return to Hakodate Next Month.

Nagasaki, Feb. 22.-The steamer tolberg has arrived here from Vladiostock with twenty white foreigners, 150 Chinese and 50 Japanese. She brings in addition forty survivors of the Jap-anese steamer Nakonoura Maru, which was sunk by the Russian cruiser squadon from Vladivostock on February 11th. Iwo of these were drowned during their transfer to the Russian ships. The surivors were well treated and provided with return passage.

The Vladivostock squadron intended o bombard Hakodate but a snowstorm prevented the vessels from entering the Straits of Tsuruga. They intend make another attempt to reach Hako date in March with cruisers, five torpedo boats and an armed transport.
