VANCOUVER NOTES.

The proprietors of the Palace hotel were fined \$25 and costs in the police after 1 o'clock during prohibited hours. with some of the Blackstones who were the magistrate concluded there had been not a flagrant offence. Because of this, the fine was only half the usual amount in such cases.

The interim injunction granted the British Columbia Telephone Company on January 19th was on Friday continued on the application of L. G. McPhillips, K. The order enjoins the corporation of Fernie from interfering with the Brit-ish Columbia Telephone Company in its work of installing a telephone system in the city of Fernie. Bill Has Been Introduced in Dominion House Providing for Several

(From Saturday's Daily.)

A telegram from Ottawa to the Times to-day states that Hon. R. Prefontaine has given notice of a bill which will be introduced into the Dominion House of Commons doing away with many of the causes of complaint in the Shipping Masters Act. The bill provides for abolishing the 50 cent fee charged by the shipping master and aims to place British Columbia ports on a more equitable basis with ports on the American side. The 50 cent fee is payable upon each engagement of a seaman effected before a shipping master or deputy shipping master, but it is not the main grievance of the British Columbia shipping men. The nost objectionable clause in the act as it stands at present is that "No person other than the shipping master or deputy shipping master shall hire, engage, sup ply or provide a seaman to be entered on board any ship, not being a Canadian home trade ship, or ship in the merchant
