Says Meteorites gave earth life. Berlin, December 3.—Professor Banes, the famous Palerontologist, has advanced what he terms a new theory of the origin of life. He does not accept the theory of spontaneous generation as a solentific solution, nor the biblical explanation, which pre-supposes a miracle, but declares that life is as old as lifeless matters of which the stars and planets are composed. Life, Professor Baucs holds, has been "vaccinated into the earth by life germs from other planets through meteorites."

The scientist maintains that the typothesis is strongly supported by indications of the existence of life in all the planets.
