NEW I. C. R. STEAMER ADRIPT.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Sept. 20.—The Anchor Line steamer, Adriapt, Captain Young, from Glasgow and Moville for New York, which arrived here today, reports that when 300 miles off Newfoundland she fell in with the Intercolonial railway ferry steamer Scotia, which left the "Yankee" for Port Mulgrave, N. S.

Provisions were scarce on the Scotia and the crew were reduced to one biscuit each three times a day. Three days ago an American yacht bore down upon the Scotia in answer to distress signals and gave the crew such much provision as could be spared.
