NO GRAIN CONVEYORS

READY FOR THIS WINTER BARK AUBURNDALE

Special Meeting of the Common Council Will Discuss Situation With the Minister of Public Works.

A special meeting of the Common Council has been called for 11.30 tomorrow morning to meet the Minister of Public Works, the Hon. Wm. Pugsley, and receive from him information regarding the grain conveyors at West St. John for the new wharves.

The report of the C. P. R. engineers in this matter shows that the cost of the proposed conveyors will be much greater than was at first estimated. The amount was set roughly at \$90,000 but a closer estimate puts the figure much higher. The report also shows that it would be impossible to get the conveyors ready much earlier than the end of the winter season.

Owing to these facts it is possible that the meeting may discuss arrangements for securing a floating conveyor or making some other arrangements for handling the winter business. Taken in conjunction with the big grain trade promised for this winter the situation promises to be a difficult one to cope with.
