LOCAL NEWS

St. John Exhibition, September 12th to 19th.

The ladies' committee will meet at the Protestant Orphan Asylum, on Thursday, September 3rd, at 2 o'clock.

The funeral of the late Hugh Blair will be held on Friday at 2:15 p. m. from his late home 245 City Road.

The steamer Mount Royal, of the C. P. R. Atlantic service arrived at Quebec at 8.40 on Tuesday evening and will land passengers this morning.

A young man was arrested this morning charged with beating his wife. It appeared, however, that the matter was only a little family squabble and he was allowed to go.

About 1.30 o'clock this morning Walter Cody died at his late residence, St. James Street. The deceased was brother of M. J. Cody, the Charlottetown street shoe merchant, and has been ill for some time past. Besides a wife and two children he leaves two brothers and two sisters.

On the arrival of the Sussex train, Mr. Herbert Sherwood, of Norton, King's, son of Mr. James Sherwood, and Miss Edie Mary Boon, of Norton, formerly of Dorchester, England, daughter of Mr. Fred. Boon, were united in marriage by the Rev. James Crisp, at the Methodist parsonage Church, 7 Burpee Ave. Miss Alice G. Crisp and Mr. J. King Kelley, Esq., were present as witnesses.

A despatch from Ottawa states the indication is that the railway commission will make an order modifying to some extent the regulations that no trains can be broken up on Sunday, and no cars of perishable freight forwarded to destination on Sunday, as is now held under the provisions of the Lord's Day Act. The application of the Grand Trunk for modification and the resistance of the Lord's Day Alliance to such an order was continued before the commissioners yesterday and will be continued today.

They paddled part of the way up the river from the Kennebecus and then travelled by boat and train to Grand Falls. NO GRAIN CONVEYORS

READY FOR THIS WINTER

Special Meeting of the Common Council Will Discuss Situation With the Minister of Public Works.

BARK AUBURNDALE IS REPORTED MISSING

It is Feared That She Has Foundered—Carried a Crew of Nine Men.

A special meeting of the Common Council has been called for 11.30 to-morrow morning to meet the Minister of Public Works, the Hon. Wm. Pageley, and receive from him information regarding the grain conveyors at West St. John for the new wharves.

The report of the C. P. R. engineers in this matter shows that the cost of the proposed conveyors will be much greater than was at first estimated. The amount was set roughly at \$60,000 but a closer estimate puts the figure much higher. The report also shows that it would be impossible to get the conveyors ready much earlier than the end of the winter season.

Owing to these facts it is possible that the meeting may discuss arrangements for securing a floating conveyor or making some other arrangements for handling the winter business. Taken in conjunction with the big grain trade promised for this winter the situation promises to be a difficult one to cope with.

METHODISTS MEET

MAYOR BULLOCK

The Manly Art Their Subject of Discussion

Both Sides Hold to Previously Expressed Views and No Change is Expected in the Civic Policy.

The committee of Methodists who were appointed at the district meeting last Thursday to interview the mayor regarding boxing exhibitions, waited on Mr. Bullock this morning and had a lengthy session with him.

The committee was composed of J. Hunter White, who acted as spokesman, Rev. S. Howard and Rev. H. D. Marr.

After their interview the committee appeared somewhat ruffled and were not anxious to discuss the matter when approached by a Star reporter. They said that the position they took was that stated at last week's meeting. Their church did not approve of the bouts, and they wished the mayor to put a stop to them. They deplored the fact that so much publicity had been given to the matter, and said that until the committee had deliberated on the matter and prepared their report they would be unable to give any official information regarding the meeting.

Mayor Bullock, when questioned regarding the discussion, said that he had already stated his position in the matter, which is that the boxing exhibitions are permitted by law and that he will not take it on himself to stop them, and that this was his reply to the delegation. As he had promised the committee that he would not be interviewed in the matter, he could say nothing further.

It is understood that the meeting was an interesting one. The committee when they entered were met with a question to produce the resolution regarding the matter which rather nonplussed them as they had forgotten to bring it with them. Another feature of the delegation was the absence from the committee of both the mover and seconder of the resolution who were not given an opportunity to present in person the charges they had made at the district meeting. The members of the committee presented the church's side of the question seemed to feel strongly on the matter and as the people who were gathered pressed the mayor to refuse to grant any further licenses for such bouts.

As far as could be learned the substance of the mayor's reply was that he was administering the laws of the city as that as the people who were governed by the laws were not all members of their denomination or even of any church the laws could not be modified by him to suit their views alone.

They were given the suggestion that if the did not suit them there were steps which they could take to have it modified.
